Native perennials started in January at a Locks Propagation Workshop are finally large enough to be planted **Native evergreen** starts are only NOW ready for individual potting up

Donated monies are allowing us to purchase more **Venus Dogwoods** too!

We hope that by the time you read this, all of these new plants will be happily growing at East Montlake Park. The fall, winter, and spring rains will greatly assist their ability to survive our Seattle summers without supplemental irrigation.

Many thanks are due to the US Army Corps of Engineers staff at the Locks Greenhouses for keeping so many cuttings alive this summer. The **native evergreen** propagation starts are FINALLY showing enough roots so they can be potted-up. **A "Potting-Up Work Party" for this will be announced via email soon.**

Rain patter reminds us to attach those city rain barrels to our roof gutters - a great way to water our gardens in drier times and help storm drain run-off.

Fish and aquatic life, could they talk, would thank you for safe disposal of unused, outdated medicines. These drugs are showing up in our treated wastewater, aquifers and Puget Sound waterways! GCA's Centennial Committee Breaks Ground!

Just as this newsletter was going to press, Garden Club of America and many invited guests were officially breaking ground on the 2013 Central Park Founders Fund Project. This is the project our president Laurie Riley wrote of last month. It is a joint venture between GCA and Central Park Conservancy and focuses on the East 69th entrance of the Park. It endeavors to improve the entrance by enlarging it and opening up views currently obscured by massive plantings. The desire is to keep these improvements in harmony with the original Frederic Olmstead design of the Park.

There were not many Seattleites who made the trek back to New York City in early October, but my NYC contact, a young daughter who jogs through Central Park, says she hopes the 69th area will include some spring bulbs that remind her of our Pacific Northwest springs. And the GCA daffodils have been mentioned in the plan! Even if we could not attend, we can all feel a pride in the fact that all 200 GCA Clubs as well as individual donors participated in this Founders Fund. Over \$500,000 was contributed by Garden Club of America and its members in honor of our Centennial. *Carey Davis*

GARDENER'S CORNER



Thoughts for November:

- Relocate clay pots to a protected area to prevent cracking over winter
- Harvest remaining summer produce. Compost flower and vegetable trimmings.
- Remove slugs' hiding places by cleaning out dead leaves.
- Mulch roses but don't prune severely now. Cut back perennial beds.
- Fertilizing your lawn with a 3-1-2 (N-P-K) ratio is important in the fall; do it this month if you haven't done so already.
- Transplanting is recommended this month; new roots grow during winter. Dig planting holes just as deep as the root ball but two to three times as wide. Settle plants just at soil level, not deeper.
- Finish planting bulbs! Use bulb fertilizer or bone meal in planting holes.
- Drain built-in sprinkler systems; insulate the valve mechanisms.
- Clean, sharpen and oil garden tools before storing them for the winter.
