It has been a stellar fall with Provisional talks and walks through the Arboretum! Lindsay Price highlighted the Japanese Maple Collection on a dry Monday in October,

and Megan Smith led a detailed tour of the Pacific Connections Collection under sunny skies in November. Both ladies studied hard, saying that their biggest challenge was to reduce the vast amount of information into thirty minutes. Randall Hitchin has been a valuable resource as our 'go to' man about the plant collections in the Arboretum. He's eager and available to answer questions anytime. What a treasure!

Speaking of treasures, several of us are working hard to restore our own Fragrance Garden at CUH. We gathered on November 15 to remove some unwanted plants from the garden bed closest to the NHS building. This bed will be phase one of the renovation. The extent of our restoration will depend on our Community Projects Grant that Debbi Wilson is preparing.

The current seed share project has been highly successful! Thank you to all who contributed. Those who participated had first dibs on the exchange both from within SGC and from the recent Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference. My goal is to Share it, Grow it, Plant it and finally Show it! Please make note of your new seeds = plants and bring them to a Hort Share when flowering. Again, thank you to Vicki Reed for her innovative and terrific plan for Hort Share. It's working!

The annual plum for the Horticulture Chair is attendance at the GCA horticulture conference, better known as the Shirley Meneice, each fall. Suzy Titcomb and I were the lucky recipients this year, and it's thanks to you, SGC, for making it possible. Most of our lectures were held at the U.S. National Arboretum, which had been closed until four days prior to the conference! Learning about the research and hybridizing methods of new plants that are tested before being released into the trade was insightful. Not only did the government cooperate by allowing us to enjoy the vast collections at the National Arboretum, U.S. Botanic Gardens, the Capitol with the Olmsted-designed grounds and Mt. Vernon, but the weather allowed us to enjoy all of these outdoor spaces too! Catch phrases such as "biodiversity" and "economically balanced" were ever-present.

This was my third Shirley Meneice Conference. The first was in Rye, N.Y. as a delegate attending alongside 2008 Hort Chair Debbi Wilson. Last year, Marianne Kitchell joined me in Austin, Texas, primarily at the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. Most recently, Suzy Titcomb and I were wined, dined and horticulturally stimulated for days in Washington D.C. *To those whom much is given much is expected* (John F. Kennedy).

GCA Judging Program Update

Congratulations to our recently promoted members, Catherine Allan, Prospective Judge in Photography and Jenny Wyatt, Prospective Judge in Horticulture!

Page 41 of our Green Book lists SGC members who are part of the Garden Club of America Judging Program. Being a GCA Judge is the only lifetime appointment in GCA. The process of becoming an approved judge can take eight years in Zone XII. Most of us were just in Santa Barbara at our bi-annual judging workshop. We are required to attend 10 hours of workshop every two years. Travel is a part of the judge's job in our zone! Approved judges can be recognized by the oak leaf judging pin they wear.

The next major show in our zone will be in Portland, May 16-18, 2014. There will be a lecture on Saturday the 17th by Noel Kingsbury. Gardeners Corner

Thoughts for December



- Now that you have weeded, deslugged and mulched your garden, it's time to finish planting spring bulbs, transplant trees and shrubs. Keep watering newly planted trees and shrubs if necessary.
- Clean leaves of indoor plants with damp cloth or sponge so they can absorb as much light as possible during the dark months ahead.
- Use dormant sprays of lime sulfur or copper fungicide on fruit trees and roses for general disease control.
- Force fragrant paperwhites for your holiday décor. In case you can't recall last year's Cornell University research program findings, to prevent tall foliar growth and unwieldy stems do as follows:
 - Start bulbs in plain water. When roots have formed and the green shoot is 1 to 2 inches long, pour off water and replace with a solution of 4 to 6 percent alcohol; that works out to 1 part gin (or the like) to 7 parts water. Keep beer and wine for yourself as their sugars damage plants!
- Salud and happy holidays!

GCA Redwood Grove

Seattle Garden Club has supported the GCA Redwood Grove for many years through an annual gift from the membership/contributions list. Our gift, along with others from GCA Clubs and individuals, helps to pay off the purchase price to which GCA agreed when the grove was purchased. I thought you might enjoy a few facts about this GCA Grove, the first GCA Conservation Project.

Size: 5,130 acres

Location: near Eureka, CA in Humboldt Redwoods State Park; a 5 hour drive north of San Francisco. Our grove is the entire watershed of Canoe Creek. The Eel River runs through the grove.

Dedication: 1934, following the GCA Annual Meeting in Seattle

Original purchase price: \$3,535,000.00 (Segments purchased from 1930's

to 1970). GCA Agreed to pay \$1,767,399.00

Balance due as of October, 2013: \$231,513.00

GCA President Katie Heins has said that the Executive Committee "is committed to making a final effort to erase the balance of the acquisition costs" in the coming year. To this end clubs and individuals coast to coast are making contributions to protect the redwoods and foster an appreciation for the majestic forests.
