Laura Dewell, founder of Green Plate Special to speak at November General Meeting



Founded in 2011, the mission of Green Plate Special is to inspire and empower youth to experience food in new ways through gardening, cooking and eating together. Green Plate Special is focused on nutrition, eating and cooking healthy on a budget. While 21% of all King County youth are overweight, middle and high school students who are African American or from other communities of color are two to three times more likely to be overweight or obese. The causes are

many, including a lack of access to fruits and vegetables in south Seattle, "fast food" advertising and negative messages about eating, and a lack of experience in cooking affordable, healthy food. This racial disparity leaves youth of color at risk for type 2 diabetes and other obesity-related diseases that foster cycles of poverty by condemning them to life-long, expensive treatments that hinder their economic self-sufficiency.

Over the next year, Green Plate Special will engage more than 200 low-income, ethnically diverse middle school students (ages 10 - 14) through in-classroom and after-school, hands-on learning of growing and cooking healthy food. In addition, a paid internship has been established for youth who have already gone through the program and planning is underway to develop programming for the families of youth who participate in the program to broaden the impact.

Gardener's Corner

Fruits, Burrs and Horticultural Handbags

Late September took me back to my childhood wonder days. While harvesting seeds on my kitchen table, I sat in awe as I scanned the variety of shapes, sizes and forms of the seed pods in front of me. In many ways they reminded me of ladies' handbags with their little compartments, perfectly formed to provide that unique plant with the best method of seed dispersal. There was the Lilium Regale with an elongated trisection seed head sheltering a veritable "Rolodex system" for holding it's progeny. Then, of course, there's the Nigella caerulea, with it's antennaed, miniature cantaloupe seed pod, so engulfed with seeds that it's no wonder everyone succeeds when casting Love In The Mist! But the seed head that really flipped my switch...was the Eucomis bicolor! Sporting an indented, rounded fleshy seed pod with chartreuse and ruby overtones, this seed pod was as fascinating as the pineapple lily flower itself. Harboring only a few large seeds, my guess was that these babies like to root close to home.

Of course, Mother Nature, in her infinite wisdom has figured out a way for these seeds to get to their new home. Whether it's the fleshy Cornus kousa fruits that get eaten by the deer and passed along a few hours later, or a breezy day that carries the lowly dandelion with it's fine hair extensions to your home, the modes of transportation are numerous. One of the largest fruits, the buoyant coconut, is carried by water – a method so successful that it's colonized almost all of the beaches in the tropics. And of course, how many of us have painfully combed out burrs from our dog or even our own hair!

With all this talk of seeds, I encourage you to experience growing seeds in your garden or someone else's. I had such fun this fall sharing Love in the Mist seed pods with my neighbor's children and seeing the wonder in their faces as we cast them together in their garden. Imagine their delight next June!

'Northwest Passages' is Underway!

Mark your calendars for May 15-16, 2015 for Northwest Passages, a GCA Flower Show celebrating the splendor of the Pacific Northwest. The Show will be held at the spectacular Bellevue Botanical Garden in the new Jim Olsen designed Visitor and Education Center.

Our schedule and entry forms are posted in the member's area of the SGC website: www.seattlegardenclub.org. Please check it out! Whether your area of interest is Floral Design, Photography or Horticulture (or all of the above!), get ready to join in the fun of entering. The Show will also feature an educational conservation exhibit on rainwater.

Because of the six-month ownership requirement for some of its classes, Horticulture registration has already begun. We are now full for Class 21 (Sarracinia challenge class) and Class 22 (Canoes), but there are still openings in Class 23 (Climbing Plants, novices only); Class 24 (Miniatures); and Class 26-27 (Baird Boards).

Of particular importance is **Class 25 'Follow the Fragrance'**: "A single species or cultivar of a fragrant Tulip, planted in a terra cotta pot of the exhibitor's choosing, not to exceed 12". To be viewed in the round. Six month ownership requirement. Open to all GCA Clubs on November 1, 2014." We are actively seeking exhibitors for this class, since bulbs must be purchased by November 15, 2014. To register, please contact the Horticulture Registrar, Catherine Allan (jardinsroyaux@gmail.com) and turn in a completed entry form (found on our website) to her.

We would love to have every member of SGC participate in the show. Joining a committee is another way to get involved. Please take a look at the committee structure in the schedule and let us know how you would like to volunteer. Onward we go!
