GARDENER'S CORNER

Thoughts for September:

 Start thinking about ordering spring-blooming bulbs. Take advantage of end-of-season sales.



- Remove and compost spent annuals.
- Photograph what you particularly liked (or didn't) in this year's garden and containers as a reference for planning next year's garden.
- Scratch in a handful of lime around each hellebore plant.
- Don't deadhead roses after fall bloom. When you let them produce hips you prepare them for winter dormancy.
- Fertilize lawns with 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer, using slow-release formula. Late in the month, begin fall renovation with thatching, aerating and overseeding.
- Evergreen shrubs and trees can be planted or transplanted now.
- Control slugs....this is their breeding season.

Happy Birthday GCA!

As we turn our gardens towards autumn and renew our Garden Club friendships, Garden Club of America launches a year-long celebration of its 100th anniversary. There is a flotilla of events planned in New York City including a week-long dedication program in June, an exhibit of rare books, and the culmination of the Centennial Tree Project.

1913 might seem to be an inauspicious time to embark on a club devoted to preserving America's beauty. World War 1 was just around the corner (1914), and only 35% of households had electricity. Arizona and New Mexico had just become states (1912), and Seattle itself was still recovering from the 1889 disastrous fire and would not emerge as a shipping giant until the Panama Canal opened in 1914. On the other hand, Frederick Law Olmsted died in 1903, having been a key figure in the 1850 creation of Central Park. The popularity of golf and subsequently of lawn maintenance soared after a US gold in the 1904 Olympics. Hybrid tea roses were quite fashionable in the 1910's era. So the Club began.

Soon members were sending seeds to war torn Europe, promoting National Parks, protesting against billboards as well as educating themselves in horticulture and making floral arrangements. William Seale's book, *The Garden Club of America 1913-2012, A Growing Legacy* is promised to give a full history of GCA. It is due to come out in October.
