The Gardener's Corner

Thoughts for November

- Clean, sharpen, oil and store your garden tools.
 They've worked hard for you this year.
- Winterize your mower. Run it until it's out of gas, or add fuel stabilizer to the tank. Then sharpen or replace the blade, change the oil, and check the spark plug before stowing it for winter.
- Finish planting bulbs, adding bone meal or bulb fertilizer into the planting hole as you prepare the hole. They need water <u>until</u> they bloom. They go dormant in summer.
- Cut back mums 4 to 6 inches after they finish blooming.
- Move container plants into winter shelter. Try using bubble wrap on larger clay or cement containers.
- Cut back perennials. Divide the overgrown ones by digging out entire plant and dividing with a spade.
- Review last year's garden, consider the changes or additions you may wish to make.

Manipulation - wherein the exhibited photograph is either a compilation of two or more photos, a multiple exposure or an HD (high definition) enhanced photo. Plant material required. Registration for this Class open to those in the Photography Judging Program only. All photos for exhibition only.

Farewell to FRIEND of SEA and SHORE: PEOPLE FOR PUGET SOUND

In Memoriam

With sadness and dismay, we report the demise of an articulate and active guardian of the shores and waters of Puget Sound. After 20 years of effectively working for protection and restoration of Puget Sound, with both paid and volunteer help, the non-profit group (founded by Kathy Fletcher, our 2011 recipient of the Non-Member Conservation Commendation) is ceasing operations.

Its Board of Directors is transferring the People for Puget Sound programs and remaining staff to two partner operations: Washington Environmental Council (WEC) and Earth Corps. Dow Constantine, King County Executive, praised People for Puget Sound and exhorted us citizens to "pick up the baton and carry forward this urgent and vital mission."

Expect that we will follow and join the work of Earth Corps and Washington Environmental Council!

The Erna Gunther Garden at The Burke Museum

To continue the review of past Seattle Garden Club Community Projects, I am reporting this month on the status of the Erna Gunther Garden at The Burke Museum at the University of Washington.

SGC Funds have been donated as follows:

1983: \$2100 for plants for the Erna Gunther Garden

1990: \$2100 to the Erna Gunther Garden

1999: \$4750 to the Garden

2004: \$2000 for renovation of the Garden at the

Burke following remodel of the Museum.

The Erna Gunther Garden at the Burke contains primarily ethnobotanical specimens that are native to the region and important to people living here. The garden sits at the front entrance to the museum. The Burke is in the midst of a long-range plan that will result in the construction of a new museum (perhaps to open in 2018) near its present location. A new Erna Gunther Garden will be part of any new museum plan.

The Erna Gunther Garden's very natural appearance has been questioned as looking uncared for or untidy. Laurie Ahern and I met with Julie Stein, Executive Director of the Burke, who explained the intent of the native plants to reflect their native appearance rather than that of a more formal garden. The appearance is appropriate for a garden containing plants found naturally in our local forests and prairies. She related that the Burke has hired a Native American plant specialist to care for the Erna Gunther Garden and who will participate in the planning for native plants in the landscaping of the new museum.

The architect for the Burke's design and construction is Olson Kundig Architects. The lead architect designer, Tom Kundig, agrees with Julie Stein that the garden should reflect the Burke's vision "to inspire people to value the interconnection of all life – and act accordingly." By that he means that people realize that air, water, rocks, animals, plants, fossils, and especially peoples are all related, and that the Burke's decisions should reflect those connections.

East Montlake Park Report

October work parties dug wild invasives and cut horsetails that are rapidly filling the park. It seems that more sunlight allowed horsetails to grow with a vengeance. In May we tried a weeding experiment that compared pulling horsetails versus cutting them 3-4" tall. The area where they were cut is definitely less dense with horsetails.

The theory: When the horsetails are cut, the roots try so hard to keep the remaining stem alive that it weakens the root system. We will continue to cut the horsetails that return and hope they continue to diminish. Next summer we hope for improvement!

The BAD news: The park was not as presentable over summer as we would have liked.

<u>The GOOD news</u>: The horsetails provided shade through the very hot August and September so we have had minimal native plant losses (watering only the dogwoods)!

I will send an email blast for volunteers to help plant the propagated native evergreens growing at the Government Locks Greenhouses when rain finally returns!
