Founders Fund Award Vote

It's that time of year when each GCA club submits a vote for the current year's Founders Fund Awards. The Founders Fund was created in 1934 in honor of the first GCA President, Elizabeth Price Martin. With remarkable vision, energy and perseverance, The Garden Club of America has saved thousands of acres of land, innumerable trees and enriched multitudes. Historic landmarks have been restored and civic plantings flourish in countless communities nationwide. Research and education projects enrich young and old. Along with the winners, the runners-up for the awards have made distinguished contributions to their communities.

Individual members in each club vote for one of three proposals, which are previously determined by the national FF committee. Club Presidents then cast each clubs' winning selection electronically, and the winner is announced at the Annual GCA meeting in Rochester, NY this spring. The winner will receive \$30,000 and each runner up \$7,500. Please familiarize yourself with this year's proposals by reading the Winter issue of the GCA Bulletin or logging on to the Founders Fund webpage in the Members Area of the GCA website. You will be casting your vote at the General meeting on March 19, 2015.

Seattle Garden Club projects have been chosen as runners-up four different times for two projects. In 1940 and 1942 for azalea hybridization for Azalea Way in the Arboretum, and in 1959 and 1967 for beautification of the Lake Washington Ship Canal. Perhaps the time has come to begin exploring current possibilities in our area. There is all the information on the process to be found on the GCA website Founders Fund section. I have been asked to be the FF representative for SGC and would like to form a committee to look into finding a worthy proposal in our region. February Board Meeting

Motion: To approve the recommendation from the SGC Community Projects Committee to the SGC Governing Board to fund three Community Projects for 2014-2015, as follows, was seconded and approved.

- Phase II SGC Fragrance Garden Renovation, CUH \$16,000
- Planting a prominently located garden bed at Volunteer Park. (Volunteer Park Trust) \$10,000
- One hundred hand-drawn botanicals (of 1000 drawings) that will illustrate the revision of the authoritative one-volume *Flora of the Pacific Northwest*. (UW Burke Museum, Herbarium) \$10,000

Gardener's Corner

Plants as Medicine

Medicine has been on my radar a lot these past few months and it got me thinking: how did early man find the key to unlock the plant-based medicinal treasure chest? What is our bond to plant life outside of its aesthetic beauty and nutritional value?

The human/ medicinal plant connection goes back some 60,000 years. In Iraq, back in the 1960's a Neanderthal man was discovered buried in a cave with eight species of plants. Seven of those plants were discovered to have medicinal purposes.

Humans have co-evolved with plants over millions of years. We drink their juices, eat their leaves and consume them in a myriad of ways. Plants are part of our chemistry and help form our body's building blocks through their protein, fats and carbohydrates. Because of this, and the fact that plants and humans share similarities in the way antioxidants protect cells, approximately 80% of the world's population employs herbs as primary medicines. In the U.S., plants are the foundation for 40% of the pharmaceuticals in use today. From aspirin (willow bark) to anti-malarial quinine (Cinchona pubescens) to the cancerfighting taxol (Taxus brevifolia), plant based remedies are used by some 5.1 billion people worldwide.

How were these plant-based medicines discovered? Some believe that plants revealed their therapeutic properties by a sign. For instance, a plant with a long twisted root might be used to treat a snakebite. Some believe it was a process of trial and error. Man gets gouged by a sharp tree branch, he has to stop the bleeding, he rubs every plant leaf he sees on the wound to induce clotting, one of them works, a remedy is born. Lastly, some plant medicines were said to be revealed to worthy individuals through visions or dreams with the medicine man right by their side to aid in the observation and testing phase of a botanical cure.

Approximately 7,000 medical compounds prescribed by western doctors are derived from plants, with the potential for many more. We must continue to communicate with healers from other continents to preserve remedies that have been passed down through the generations. Also imperative is the preservation of the rainforest for it holds a treasure trove of healing power yet to be discovered. The wonder of plants is never ending.

Community Projects Report

The Community Projects Committee will be presenting the following motion at the Business Meeting on February 19, 2015.

MOTION to approve the recommendation from the SGC Governing Board to fund three Community Projects for 2014-2015, as follows:

- Phase II SGC Fragrance Garden Renovation, CUH \$16,000
- Planting a prominently located garden bed at Volunteer Park (Volunteer Park Trust) \$10,000
- Funding one hundred hand-drawn botanicals (of 1000 drawings) that will illustrate the revised edition of the authoritative one-volume *Flora of the Pacific Northwest*. (UW Burke Museum, Herbarium) \$10,000

The Fragrance Garden Phase II plans and budget were reviewed by a CP sub-Committee that unanimously recommended to the Community Projects committee full funding of the request. Phase II focuses on the renovation and refurbishment of the garden and addressing the issues surrounding the removal of a diseased Striped Bark Maple, which also contaminated the soil beneath and adjacent to the tree. In addition the Governing Board recommended that the Policy and Planning committee should review the funding and organizational structure of the Fragrance Garden.

Volunteer Park, designed by John Charles Olmsted in 1909, is among Seattle's most visited and visible park. Alarmed by this iconic Park's degradation, a group of neighbors formed the Volunteer Park Trust (VPT) in 2010 to provide stewardship. VPT proposes to restore a large, lozenge-shaped bed prominently located to the south/east of the reservoir. The bed--approximately 150' x 10' to 30'--has been cleared of weeds by volunteers and would be replanted with a palette that echoes the original Olmsted planting plan. The request is for \$10,000 and the Committee recommended full funding.

U.W. Burke Herbarium grant requested funding to support the revision of a 1971 resource book "Flora of the Pacific Northwest", which documents diversity and distribution of plants, lichens, fungi and algae, throughout the Pacific Northwest. The Burke requested SGC support 100 of 1000 new pen and ink illustrations for revised edition, at a cost of \$10,000. This updated volume will be used as a text for undergraduate and graduate plant biology classes as well as in the field by researchers, botanists, and gardeners. SGC will be listed as a "Project Supporter". The text's education and conservation uses meet both the GCA and SGC "Mission" statements. The Community Projects recommended full funding of this request.

Photography Report

Upcoming Committee Events:

On March 23 at 10:00am, members of the Photography Committee are invited to spend two hours with iPhonography instructor, Teri Lou Dantzler. Teri Lou will teach us tips and techniques for taking better photos with our smart phones. In early March, I will email the committee to find out how many members are interested in attending (some have already let me know of their interest). Once I know numbers, I'll confirm the location of the workshop with the committee.

A Photographic 'Recipe':


Want to try getting 'soft' water photos similar to the ones Justin Reznick showed us during his talk at the January General Meeting? Here are some tips for capturing smooth flowing water:

- 1) You will need a tripod so that you can keep the shutter open long enough for the water to flow.
- 2) Use a high f-stop. f/22 or higher (to reduce the amount of light coming in so the image doesn't get over exposed. The higher the better!)
- 3) Set your ISO to 100.
- 4) Turn off the Auto Focus once you have focused on your subject.
- 5) Try to be in a lower light setting (overcast, shady or early/late in the day) OR use a ND (neutral density) filter to reduce the amount of light coming in and hitting the sensor. A polarizing filter can also darken the scene enough to allow the shutter to stay open longer.
- 6) Try to have a shutter speed of at least 1 second or longer. If you are in Aperture Priority and the shutter speed isn't slow enough, that is when you will want to add a ND or a polarizing filter. If you are shooting in Manual and your photo is over exposed then a filter or darker setting will help.
- 7) A shutter release cable can be helpful in preventing camera shake...or set your camera's automatic timer for a 2 second delay.

Have fun experimenting with your cameras! Share your results with everyone by sending your photos to me or Kim for viewing on the website!
