#### 12,000 Rain Gardens in Puget Sound Campaign

Rain gardens need rain gardeners to demonstrate how beautiful and enriching it can be to engage in civic and environmental improvement. Aaron Clark, director of the Stewardship Partners 12,000 Rain Gardens Program will share the beauty



and benefits of rain gardens throughout the Puget Sound region. For the past 15 years, Stewardship Partners has been shifting the paradigm of environmental action one landowner at a time. In addition to the 12,000 Rain Gardens Program, they manage the Salmon-Safe eco-label that certifies properties for their sustainable environmental practices, and the Snoqualmie Stewardship Program that actively restores river and stream side habitat in the Snoqualmie Valley. Aaron D. Clark (Ph.D.) runs the 12,000 Rain Gardens in Puget Sound program in partnership with WSU Extension. In addition to his work on rain gardens, Aaron has studied migration evolution in songbirds at UW, and disappearing frogs as a student at Reed College.

## A Delightful Read Offered by Garden Club of America




Even though an early spring has come to Pacific Northwest gardeners, April is promised to bring enough rainy days to appease most appetites for reading. The Curious Mister Catesby by Charles Nelson is promised to delight gardeners and historians alike as well as other readers. While the title may remind one of a child's storybook, it is actually a fabulously illustrated book about Mark Catesby (1682-1749), a British naturalist who came to the Americas in 1712 to visit a sister (who had married against the family's wishes) and found such interest in the flora and fauna that he collected and sketched much of the New World. He retuned to England after 7 years and so impressed the Royal

Society that several Fellows financed his next trip of 4 years. He spent the next 17 years compiling his **Natural History**. This book used folio-sized plates of his watercolors. Catesby learned to do the etchings himself. The

original plates are housed in the Royal Library of Windsor Castle and in the 1980's and 90's were exhibited in the United States and elsewhere. Finally in 1747, the naturalist had time to marry (with the approval of his family) but died a few years later.

The Tercentennial of Catesby's first trip to America coincided with Garden Club of America's own Centennial in 2012. GCA was a strong supporter of the Catesby Trust who masterminded the publication of Charles Nelson's book on the naturalist. Nelson himself is a well-known Irish botanist with several other books to his name. In recognition of GCA's support, this book will be available on the Club's website at a reduced rate to all Garden Club Members.

#### **Gardener's Corner**

## Big Bloom in a Small Package

This month I had the fortunate occasion to walk through New York City's Central Park. My son and I walked from 54th Street all the way to 94th via the park where I was able to gawk at the stately elms and the mottle patchwork bark of the muscular sycamore trees. It occurred to me there that while our gardens may not be able to accommodate such huge majestic trees, our yards might be able to harbor *just one more* small tree. Or perhaps, we've grown tired of pruning that supposed "small" tree and the time is right to replace an old friend with a newer, truly small scale tree, and one that will outlive us all.

I am one of those people who needs a tree "re-do." My beloved Acer palmatum 'Moonglow' has succumbed to verticillium wilt. While I'm saddened, I'm also overjoyed at the opportunity to acquaint myself with the new, lovely Styrax japonicus 'Evening Light'. Growing only 10 to 12 feet tall by around 6 feet wide, this lusty, sun loving purple leaf beauty won't outgrow her new home. The ultra-fragrant white bell blooms dangling from striking maroon stems will undoubtedly become one of my favorite spring bloomers. But wait, there's more. She will flaunt her jewel like flowers yet again in the fall if I remember to water her enough...and I will.

But not so fast...the Tokyo Flower Fringe Tree or Chionanthus retusus 'Tokyo Tower' looks awfully appealing too! With 4 seasons of beauty that features: peeling golden tan bark, wispy clouds of fleecy white fragrant spring flowers, blue fruits and yellow fall color, I can hardly go wrong. Plus, it's 15 x 6 foot narrow silhouette will fit into my yard nicely.

But then again, how can I resist those gigantic magenta blooms of the Magnolia 'Genie'? With fragrant maroon teacup flowers displayed on bare branches and a compact 13 x 5 size, I'm thinking that if I choose not to plant this beautiful specimen one of my SGC friends will surely have the good sense to do so. As if that's not enough, this magnolia likes to do an encore in mid-summer. With color, form and fragrance, someone will likely succumb!

Styrax 'Evening Light', Chionanthus 'Tokyo Tower' and Magnolia 'Genie', are all delightfully compact, spring blooming trees that will not outgrow your yard. Imagine one less tree to prune replaced by a new one to love (and prune free!). I'm afraid I have a hard decision to make but I relish the anticipation of a horticultural challenge.


