Photography Report

I Didn't Win A Ribbon....Now What?

Sometimes learning can have more impact AFTER an event rather than before. This is related to the basic concept of 'learning from our mistakes', which helps us - better than anything - in building a better understanding of how to achieve our goals.

I view flower shows as a chance to hone the skills that I've been learning throughout the year. When I enter a show, I think more critically about which photograph to submit before, during and after the photographic process. I try to look at my photograph from the perspective of a judge. What does a judge look for? They begin (whether consciously or subconsciously) to look for the use of the *Principles and Elements of Design*. The simplest way to improve one's photography is to think like a judge and to look at one's photograph objectively using the *Principles and Elements of Design*. The GCA Judging Yellow Book goes into this extensively as part of the chapter on Judging GCA Shows. However, I found a short online slide show complete with photographic examples that will give you an overview of the Principles and Elements of Design.


Hort Report

East Montlake Park Bonus!

One of our community partners at the park, Michelle McMorran from the US Army Corps of Engineers, sent a great link to a site about watering in the Seattle area. She is still learning how it all works but the web site shows how much precipitation falls each week in Seattle. You can then program your irrigation system accordingly to adjust for the goal of 1" of moisture per week.

Michelle explains she is still learning how it all works:

If you have an irrigation clock -

- 1. Have each irrigation zone set (on your irrigation clock) to 100% of watering needs for the hottest times of the year.
- 2. Look up the irrigation index at www.iwms.org
- 3. Adjust the seasonal adjust/water budget on the clock.

I do think the real problem will be with me trying to work with my timer! Good luck to you all! Conservation Controller Tips: http://www.iwms.org/conservation-controller-tips

Gardener's Corner

Love Me or Leaf Me

Each spring I take an accounting of my deciduous trees and whether or not they've leafed out. Cornus kousa ...check, Acer palmatum 'Villa Toranto'...check, Stewartia pseudocamellia...check. Then there are the trees that seem....to.....take......forever. Sorbus aria 'Dwarfcrown'...not, Acer griseum...not, or Madison Park's row of gorgeous lagerstroemias...not. When I want spring, I want it now, because every bare tree reminds me of winter which by now I'm SO over! But there's a reason these trees are "Johnny come latelys" and I bet you've been wondering about this for some time now.

First, a little botany 101 lesson. Trees leaf out according to climate and weather, genetics and evolution. Leaf out is predominately controlled by rising temperatures, but autumn is really at the beginning of the cycle. As the days get shorter and temperatures drop, the tree starts going dormant while at the same time setting itself up to bud in the spring. As the nights get longer the tree perceives that it's time to shut down.

There are other cues as well, like water. When precipitation rates drop in August, the tree perceives that as a sign to go dormant. So unless you want your tree running around naked, remember to give it a drink!

Trees have a "cold requirement" or minimum number of cold days. After this number of days has passed and the trees have warmed to an adequate temperature, they will burst forth in bud.

However, it's not just temperature and rainfall that come into play here. Different tree species make different choices, just like people. It's all in their genes and the associated survival benefit. A big factor in the leaf out strategy lies in the tree's water carrying vessels. Trees with larger circulatory water carrying vessels like a catalpa are easily damaged by freezing temperature. Diffuse porous species or trees whose vessels are narrower are not as susceptible to cold damage. They win the race to leaf-hood. There are however, narrow water carrying trees that opt to leaf late due to their warmer weather heritage.

Now I sympathize with my ash and paperbark maple a little better. I understand their need to take it slow now so they can succeed in the garden later. And when they do decide to don their dress, I will take notice all the more as their beauty is definitely worth the wait.
