Conservation Report

The Conservation Committee is anticipating an exciting year of activities. Here is just a taste of what we have on deck for the remainder of 2016.

Working with Aaron Clark of 12,000 Rain Gardens, we invite you to please join us at 10:30 on October 5th at Barbie Snapp's home for a fun and informative morning followed by a pot luck lunch and time to chat with Aaron.

We will be installing a container rain garden using a succession of two or three galvanized watering troughs. We are trying this new method based upon a very successful rain garden at Tacoma's Tote industrial site using shipping containers. This combined effort with 12K and SGC will show us if this miniature version is an effective method of slowing and cleaning storm water runoff in areas that aren't conducive for in-ground rain gardens.



It's time to start collecting your unwanted electronics!

On November 7 from 9:00 to 10:00 am, prior to our Hort meeting, we will hold our Third Annual Electronics Recycle Event! InterConnection is now charging \$500.00 for their donation events. To avoid this charge, I will be bringing my Suburban to gather your donations. Interconnection will accept: desktops, laptops,(InterConnection, used by Microsoft, will wipe all hard drives.) monitors (LCD only), TVs (up to 40"), UPS units, servers, monitor stands, speakers, routers, switches, mice, tablets, cell phones, voip phones, printer cartridges, essentially anything that has a CPU or plugs into a computer or a network. InterConnection no longer accepts printers. I will then deliver the goods to InterConnection after our meeting. I also hope to incorporate styrofoam recycling this year, but Styro Recycle is very specific in what they will accept. I will announce those details at our next meeting to see if this idea has any interest among our members.

On a more informal level, the Conservation Committee and any interested members and guests will also be invited attend various environmental movies (IMAX), lectures and volunteer events. Stay tuned...

What we can do: Our bees need plants into the the shoulder season. 1. Think about what you will plant to help our pollinators into late fall and winter. 2. Plant trees to shade your home. As our temperatures rise, trees will provide the shade to keep the set point down on your thermostats, reducing energy consumption. Personally, I love the canopy of the Mimosa for this shady job!

Gardener's Corner

2015, The Summer We'll Never Forget

This summer, as we all know by now, will probably go down in history as being one of the driest ever. When I drive around and see Sedum 'Autumn Joy' and *Euphorbia wulfenii* looking sad, I know something's askew. The ground is bone dry, conifers are dying and now I'm really kicking myself for those impulse buys back in June that were JUST SO IRRESISTIBLE at the time. But through it all I've learned something:

- I. I have a new found appreciation for those plant stalwarts that laugh at our dry summers: corsican hellebores, ceanothus, pines, hinokis, ninebark, rosa rugosas, etc. (see more on the Xera Plant website) In other words, plant them, and avoid water thirsty plants no matter how enticing they are!
- 2. Compost, compost, compost! Healthy soil is "water in the bank". Organic material helps build and stabilize smaller micropores that increase the soil's capacity to hold water. Healthy soil acts like a sponge in the garden. And... aerate especially compacted soil.
- 3. Water in the early morning or late afternoon remembering that overhead sprinklers cast water onto the leaf surface can cause fungal issues. This has not been a problem in my garden with the exception of one lone serviceberry, a dwarf vine maple and certain roses known for black spot. Water deeply and less often for deeper, stronger root growth. Sorry about this...but those impulse buys will now have to be hand watered until they're more mature but just think about all those calories you're burning by running around with your garden hose! Exploratory digs are helpful to make sure your sprinkler system or soaker hose is emitting enough water to get to the roots of your plants. Check for moisture at least six-inches down to quench those thirsty roots.
- 4. With areas that remain dry because of foliage blockage, consider a low emitting micro sprinkler that attaches to your present sprinkler head. This will get water directly to where it's needed.

Late summer should be your time to relax, sit back and gloat over the garden. But if this is not the case (i.e., you're having to agonize over dying plants or mortgage the house to pay the water bill), make sure that you can relax next summer by giving the garden a little love this fall. Replace dead plants with water thrifty ones, check your watering system and improve your soil to ensure that you get to enjoy those lazy, hazy, crazy days of (next) summer.

What's the Impact of The Garden Club of America? Treasures in Threes: Filoli, Lurline and Betsy

The summer 2016 edition *The Bulletin* recently presented the story of Lurline Roth Coonan and Filoli, a National Trust house and formal garden in Woodside, California. Lurline has been a member of Woodside-Atherton Garden Club for over sixty years. She grew up at Filoli after her parents purchased the estate in 1937. Lurline gave a captivating talk last year on the subject of growing up on the estate in which she described beautifully designed outdoor garden rooms and how the rooms' vases inside were always graced with her mother's floral arrangements. At the time of the talk, Lurline was 95. In her 50s, she went back



to college for a degree in horticulture. She made an "A" in Lawnmower Maintenance. Alongside her many talents in the garden, Lurline is known for her floral design skills and has always thought that "flower arranging should be a joy, and learning shouldn't be a chore." In 2013, Lurline was the first recipient of the Woodside-Atherton Garden Club's Lurline Roth Coonan Medal, "for horticultural knowledge combined with artistry in floral design." In 1997 and 1998 she was awarded with the GCA Certificate of Excellence in Horticulture.

While I have not had the pleasure of knowing Lurline Roth Coonan personally, it is evident she is a remarkable lady. I am, however, familiar with Filoli and another special lady who I met when I was an intern in 1997 during the height of spring bulbs blooming: Betsy Clebsch. Now 92, Betsy wrote: A Book of Salvias: Sages for Every Garden in her 70s. For the last two decades, I have visited Betsy every couple of years. We stroll through the gardens together when all the visitors have vacated the grounds and enjoy botanical treasures of Filoli to ourselves. In June, on my most recent trip, I had the pleasure of introducing a newly graduated University of Washington student named Emma Relei to Betsy. Emma received a six month fellowship to document Filoli's plant collections. During Emma's final year as an undergraduate, I enjoyed working with her as a volunteer in the Herbarium at the Center for Urban Horticulture where I work as a graduate student. It was Emma's first time visiting Filoli. On that late afternoon we were treated with a special stroll through the sunken garden, the fragrant rose garden, and the multiple cutting beds filled with sweet peas, dahlias and poppies. I hope Emma finds the same treasures at Filoli that I did nineteen years ago.

Treasures abound, from flowers growing in the garden and floral arrangements gracing vases to the remarkable ladies like Lurline and Betsy in California and the many generous and talented women. Eve Rickenbaker
