Conservation Report

We are fortunate to live in a state that understands and values the protection of our environment. While we don't actually know what will happen come January, these next four years bring the potential of having a major impact on past, present and future conservation efforts.

I joined a conference call with the National Resource Defense Council (NRDC) which is one of the most effective environmental advocacy groups in our country. The purpose of this call was to help us understand the ramifications to our environment if promises stated during the campaign season hold true. The speakers were Rhea Suh, President of NRDC; David Goldstone, Director of Government Affairs and Susan Casey Lufkowitz, Chief Program Officer. I took six pages of notes, but some of the key items discussed were: the Paris Climate Agreement (PCA), the Clean Power Plan (CPP), the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), the protection of our public lands, environmental justice for poor communities and the defense of bedrock environmental laws.

What I did learn was that:

- I. We can't "just back out of the Paris Climate Agreement." The same process that went into creating the PCA which took <u>years</u>, is required to rescind our involvement. International goodwill and momentum would be damaged by the act of even starting this process which could take up to four years to accomplish. The world is keeping a VERY CLOSE eye on us as they are, or rather had been, looking to the United States as a critical leader in advancing environmental change and protection through the PCA.
- 2. Where we CAN make progress outside Washington DC is on our state and local platforms. Our Conservation Committee meeting at the offices of the Washington Environment Council on January 13th will be very interesting and provide information and guidance on what actions we can take to protect our beautiful state. This meeting is open to all members, please join us.
- 3. The international market is already driving the world towards clean energies.
- 4. We need to be a <u>strong and persistent</u> voice advocating for the protection of our environment. Don't lose hope, be strong. If our numbers are large enough and our voices strong enough, then we may have the power to stop or slow the denigration of environmental policies already in place. If we are lucky, we may even have the ability to put more environmental practices into action.

The division in our country is real and deep and there is a strong likelihood that these next four years will become <u>time lost</u> in the protection and healing of our environment. The bottom line is no matter what one believes about climate change, the need for clean air and water is crucial to our existence on this planet and a health benefit for ALL of us. It will take our <u>united efforts</u> to protect and promote environmental protections but **WE** are worth that fight.

In closing, I ask of you, please be active in protecting our environment.

GCA Report

I will be leading a garden tour of Savannah, Georgia and Charleston, South Carolina March 19-26. It is going to be a tour full of interesting history and southern hospitality with the chance to explore secret gardens, grand Live Oak allées, hidden alleys, and quaint, picturesque cobblestone streets. I am representing the University of Washington Botanic Gardens as your host and Susan McLeod Epstein of the Preservation Society of Charleston will be your leader.

The tour is offered by UW Botanic Gardens in partnership with <u>Earthbound Expeditions</u>, an excellent local company which organizes domestic and international excursions that explore gardens, ecology, culture and community. Past UW Botanic Gardens tour offerings have included trips to Cuba, Chile, South Africa, New Zealand, Ecuador and Costa Rica.

On the Behind the Garden Gate tour, you'll spend three nights in Savannah, GA and four nights in Charleston, SC, with a stop in Beaufort, SC along the way. The guided journey will take you to some of the oldest gardens in America, strolling through 300 years of rich history and culture with fellow garden enthusiasts.

One of the places we will visit is Middleton Place outside of Charleston. Middleton Place is a National Historic Landmark and home to America's Oldest Landscaped Gardens. The Garden Club of America has called the 65 acres "the most important and most interesting garden in America." Centuries-old camellias bloom in the winter months and azaleas blaze on the hillside above the Rice Mill Pond in the spring.

I hope you will consider joining me. It will be a fun and interesting tour of gardens featuring an extensive history of plants and people of the low country. For more information, please see the UWBG web site.

Gardener's Corner

Handsome Hellebores

Almost every other night I have that "what shall we watch tonight dear" debate with my husband. He typically wants to watch NOVA which I acquiesced to the other night as it had to do with the geological formation of gemstones. And, while I do have an affinity for sapphires, rubies and, really, any gemstone... it got me thinking about gems in the garden. One of my favorite garden gems is the "perfect perennial," the Hellebore, and while we usually love them for their beguiling flowers, it's time to appreciate a few for their fantastic foliage.

There are some forms of variegation that resemble that 'splattered paint' look – as though they're suffering from some sort of virus. Try as I may to like it, instead, when eyeing a leaf donning this variegation, my lips twist in a most unflattering, out of body experience sort of way. The I2 to 20-inch Helleborus argutifolius 'HGC Snow Fever' does not concede to that offensive variegation. Instead it looks like it was delicately frosted with snow. You'll squeal with delight when pink overtones highlight the new growth in the spring accompanying the creamy-green flowers, typical of the argutifolius (Corsican) cultivar:

Helleborus X sternii 'Silver Dollar' is another favorite of mine. As one can never have too much silver in the garden along with their perennial gems, Helleborus 'Silver Dollar' earns its place en masse as a compact 12-inch plant. The silver elongated serrated leaves are truly handsome with their rose stems and greenish flowers with rose blush on the outside of the petals. This hellebore provides a lot of "pop" in the shade garden and mixes well with everything.

When I first saw the 18-inch Helleborus 'Penny's Pink,' I swear I did a double take! It's so rare to find a pink wash on evergreen foliage that I had to have it...this gem was mine, forever. Also, justifying this purchase was my need to have those pink tones to offset my Seasonal Affective Disorder (aka, SAD) in the winter, or so I tell myself. Anyway, the luscious marbled leaves accompanied by the red stems take on an electric pink veining as they emerge. With the pink to burgundy flowers, this plant is exquisite.

I can only hope that someday my husband will eventually learn to appreciate my fondness for these garden gems. After all, they're a whole lot gentler on the credit card than sapphires, rubies and emeralds and just as exquisite!
