Conservation Report GCA Annual Meeting - May 2006 - Denver

Keynote speaker **Thomas Kiernan**, President of the National Parks Conservation Association (NPCA), urged the Garden Club of America to use its considerable power to protect a great natural treasure, our National Parks.

The NPCA, founded in 1919, three years after the National Parks Service was established, now boasts 325,000 members and a staff of 125 in 20 offices throughout the country. Its mission is to 'protect and enhance America's National Park System for present and future generations.' They believe that the National Parks embody the American spirit and provide a window to our past. They are home to the some of the rarest plants and animal species and places where every American can go to find inspiration, peace and open space.

The National Park Service was founded on a great vision, which is now tarnished. Revitalization is needed in the next few years to save our National Parks as we know them. Funding, which has not kept up with inflation, is threatening their financial health. Staffing in the parks has been slashed; in the Olympic National Park there were 130 Rangers in 2001, today there are 25. The air quality in Great Smoky Mountains National Park is worse than in Los Angeles, and Yosemite is almost as bad. One quarter of the programs at Rainier National Park have been cut. As the National Parks Service nears its 100th anniversary, the need to protect it becomes critical.

Mr. Kiernan quoted William White in his closing; " My advice is to raise more hell and less dahlias."


Eco-Tip - Cappy Rooks
