EcoTips



Americans buy 140 billion gallons of gas for their cars each year. Here are some ways to cut down on your gas consumption and do your part to help save our planet:

- 1. Get the smallest car that you can live with. Don't buy a four-wheel-drive car unless you really need it.
- **2.** Watch your speed; cars use lots less gas at 50 mph than at 70 mph.
- 3. Use your cruise control and avoid quick starts and screeching stops.
- **4.** Avoid long engine warm-ups (today's cars don't need them) and shut off your engine if idling for more than three minutes.
- **5.** Keep your car free from all extra weight. Remove roof racks if possible if not using for a while. Empty your trunk and back seat (except for your canvas bags of course!) Every pound counts.
- **6.** Good maintenance: change air filters regularly, and have spark plugs checked and replaced when needed. Keep tires properly inflated.
- Once again consolidate your errands and cut back on driving.
 Carpool or walk whenever possible.




Conservation Report

The Sense of Wonder

by Rachel Carson, Photographs by Nick Kelsh HarperCollins, 112 pages

Rachel Carson, a once shy biologist and writer, is widely credited with having started the environmental movement. She has been honored with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, a GCA National Medal and a listing in *Time* magazine's 100 most influential people of the 20th century. Her books, especially her best known *Silent Spring*, were often controversial, politicizing and polarizing. Yet, throughout her life she found solace and strength in direct encounters with nature.

Her love of the rugged outdoors began in childhood. The young Rachel's mother tutored her in nature study as they wandered over the Carson's 65-acre farm in western Pennsylvania. She repaid that debt when she took over the care of an orphaned grandnephew, Roger. She began to take him on walks in the Maine woods or on the beach, imparting to him in a natural, non-didactic way the wonder and consolations of nature. A Sense of Wonder grew out of those experiences. It was originally published as an essay ("Help your Child to Wonder") in Woman's Home Companion in 1956 and republished posthumously ten years later in the form of a book with photographs. HarperCollins published the edition under review in 1996, with new photographs by Nick Kelsh. Trudy Baldwin passed her copy to me with a suggestion that I review it. I will not relinquish her copy until I have my own. It is a stunningly beautiful book.

Forget the maxim. Go ahead. Judge this book by its cover – or I should say its dust jacket. The colors, the graphic design, the typeface, the photograph, even the beautiful matte coated cover paper reward your gaze. Open it, slowly turn those thick, luscious pages and feast your eyes on Kelsh's sensuous nature photographs. Then sink into a chair and read Carson's poetic prose about the rewards of leading a child into nature and to lifelong pleasure. You'll be in the Arboretum with a grandchild the next day.

A Very Special Opportunity



Royal Horticultural Society System of Classification will be used. The labeling authority is "Daffodils to Show and Grow," as amended each year in the December ADS Daffodil Journal supplemented by the latest printout of the ADS Data Bank.

"Predominately" means color in at least two cup zones. A reverse bicolor has a predominantly yellow perianth and a predominantly white cup where "predominantly" means at least two adjacent zones must be coded the designated color.
