# **EcoTips**

Start September by reducing water consumption at your house with these three easy ways:


1. Repair leaky toilets. Put 10 drops of red, green or blue food coloring in your



toilet tank, wait 15 minutes and see if any of the color got into the toilet bowl. If it did, replace that leaky flapper. Leaky toilets can waste hundreds of gallons of water.

- 2. Wash only full loads in your washing machine and in your dishwasher and reduce the amount of detergent. This could save up to 2000 gallons of water a year. (Plus save energy.)
- 3. Take shorter showers. By limiting showers to 5 minutes or less the average household could save thousands of gallons of water plus take off up to 100 KWh per month from your electric bill.

# Conservation Report

### Madrona Creek Daylighting Project

I hope everyone has had a glorious summer and is ready for the beauty of Fall in her gardens. Here are some Fall reminders:

- Remember to recycle and conserve in all that you do!
- Cut back on your Fall watering to allow the garden to harden off before winter, AND CONSERVE WATER!!
- Take notes as to the plants in your garden than need moving or dividing. Which ones held
  up best in the hot, dry weather? Are some too close to sprinkler heads to allow good effective
  coverage?
- NOTE: WSU is teaming with the Umatilla Tribe to grow Eastern Washington native plants for re-vegetating and restoring burn areas and disturbed areas. They hope to learn more about growing native plants and help the natural ecosystem return. EPA fines from Hanford are paying for the greenhouse and research!
- Nationally, your GCA has information on the legislature regarding: Budget and Appropriations, the Farm Bill, Beach
  Protection, Agriculture Conservation, Raw Sewage, National Landscape Conservation, National Parks Centennial Fund,
  Oceans, Polar Bears, Transportation, Wildlife Refuges, Renewable Energy and Fuels and much more! Go to the GCA
