## WEED of the Month: European Hawkweed (Hieracium sabaudum)

(www.kingcounty.gov/weeds)

European hawkweed is very much on our radar this fall. Although it closely resembles many other hawkweeds and other dandelion-like roadside weeds, it waits to flower until late in the season and tends to stand out this time of year. When European hawkweed was added to the state weed list, only a few locations of this plant were known in the state. Because of this limited distributions and the potential of impact shared by all the invasive hawkweeds, the state weed board added this hawkweed to the Class A list, the highest priority for control statewide, and asked all county weed boards to find and destroy all populations of European hawkweed. In general what you are looking for is a fairly tall, yellow-flowered perennial with multiple stems. It has quite a few small flowers near the upper part of the stem and they tend to form a loose, open, candelabra-shaped cluster. As some of us experienced last month, weed control with goats and sheep can be a fun fall activity for the whole family or the Seattle Garden Club because these animals will munch quite happily on a wide variety of weeds.

### Horticulture Committee News

The highlight for the year was the three-day Shirley Meneice Workshop held in Rye, NY. Catherine Allan joined me for an intriguing experience with horticulture experts and enthusiasts.

Because of the depth of material that we would like to share with the club, we have chosen to divide the information into segments for the next few editions of the newsletter.

Our first session, led by Courtney Marsters, the Zone XII Horticulture Representative, was an update of GCA business. Did you know that on the GCA website you can find **Information Manuals** pertinent to horticulture? Basic Plant Propagation Handbook, Chores for Gardeners, Good Gardening Practices are just a few of the titles.

We are encouraged to look up current and past editions of the Real Dirt, edited by Diana Fish from Carmel GC.

Shirley Meniece, who attended our session, shared her involvement with the **Seed Exchange** and "helpful hints" for those who save seeds. She emphasized the importance of careful documentation of your work: all pertinent information that another member would need in order to properly duplicate the plant.

Courtney emphasized the importance of each club's participation in the GCA Centennial Project, 2013: Preserving the Past, Growing the Future. A potential fit for our club could be our Partners for Plants project, the Montlake Cut Trail Renovation Project that our club has recently undertaken. Our project attracted attention and kudos from other clubs in our zone.

# Montlake Cut Trail

The East Montlake Park Project:

A joint effort of the Seattle Garden Club, Army Corps of Engineers, City of Seattle Parks Department, Boy Scouts Troop #15 and some very hungry goats!

This fall, over 100 volunteers, age 10-77, shared four great days together making a difference on a unique piece of property along the Lake Washington Ship Canal in the Montlake Cut. We made many new friends, visiting as we worked, and were entertained by a herd of goats, boats, rowing crews, the Husky Band and even a local regatta while family and friends rooted them on from "our" little park!

Members of the Seattle Garden Club and Scout Troop 15 joined professionals from Seattle Parks and Army Corps of Engineers in partnership to remove invasive plants from the park. This park began as a partnership of the SGC and Army Corps 1968-1971, with Betty Miller, Allison Andrews and many others involved. Since that time it had become overrun with invasive ivy, blackberry and clematis.

Aided by seed money from the GCA Partners for Plants program, we hired a herd of goats for 3 days to help us begin. What a fun, environmentally sensitive way to eliminate invasives from the site! Our goats LIKED eating ivy, blackberries and clematis with SGC members cutting and pulling down high debris they couldn't reach. They were quite an attraction for the Husky game!

The upper area is on Seattle City Park property. Park personnel worked with us and provided wheelbarrows, rakes, pitchforks, clippers, loppers and more. Volunteers found new favorite tools and methods to get the job done while sharing gardening tips as we worked. We recycled cardboard to cover half an acre and the City dumped 50 cubic yards of wood chips to cover it 4"-6" deep! It all had to be moved by wheelbarrow and muscle!









Over 100 volunteers joined SGC team leaders Sue Blethen, Diana Neely, and Juliet Romano, while Will Romano organized the Boy Scout Troop 15. The Romanos brought a tent and we provided coffee, treats, sandwiches, and drinks. The City provided tools, tarps, wood chips and two managers. But we ran out of chips so the Corps brought us more! The professionals helped every day, not just supervising but pushing wheelbarrows and cutting dead debris. WOW, were we impressed! Our method was to cut down, chop, top with cardboard and smother with wood chips! MUCH easier on our backs than ripping out all the roots! We will let Mother Nature smother them over a year's time.

I was so proud of all our dedicated members, some of whom returned several days to pitch in. The task was huge! Boy Scout Will Romano helped supervise the volunteers, motivating younger members to pick up trash, while their dads and SGC's Juliet, Dinah, and others wheeled loads of wood chips. Our backs thank them immensely!
