ZONE XII JUDGING WORKSHOP IN SEATTLE

It takes a lot of time and effort to be deemed worthy to be a flower show judge. Fulfilling the many requirements can be a daunting task. Judges workshops help meet those needs but often require travel to other cities and/or states. This year, those in the program from SGC were lucky to have one in their own back yard.

Our own Diana Neely, GCA Zone XII Judging Rep, and her committee, organized and hosted the 2009 Judging Workshop, September 26th to 29th, at the Seattle Edgewater Hotel. The workshop provided ten hours of continuing education for GCA Approved Judges, Prospective Judges, Candidates, and Observers contemplating entering the program. This year's event attracted 146 participants from flower arranging, horticulture or photography.

Jo Anne Rosen and Noreen Frink were local chairs for the Photography judging program. From Texas, Gay Estes, an accomplished judge in all three disciplines, was the guest photography program presenter. All photography participants were invited to enter a photograph in one of three classes, incorporating plant material and water. Prudence Hammett and Vicki Neumann were the local chairs for the Flower Arrangement participants. Gail Emmons, a very accomplished judge and flower arranger from our Zone, presented the Flower Arrangement program. Debbi Wilson and Dinah Hutchinson were the local chairs for the Horticulture participants. Arabella Dane, a truly inspirational three-discipline judge from Zone I, presented the horticulture workshop including judging roses, dahlias, cut specimens, pot-et-fleur, par, fruits and veggies. Entries were provided by members of Portland, Seattle, and Tacoma Garden clubs.

Marty Van Allen, from Zone IV, explained the changes in the new *GCA Flower Show and Judging Guide* (the Yellow Book) to all the participants. Diana Neely and Jo Anne Rosen, Zone Rep for the Flower Show Committee, rounded out the question and answer panel that included all the presenters as well as Sandy Patterson, the GCA Judging Committee Chair and Evie Cranston, the Judging Committee Vice Chair, both members of Zone XII.

Workshop participants were welcomed with a sunset dinner at the Edgewater and a power point presentation by photographer Charles Needle. The seas calmed enough on Monday night for a cruise of Elliott Bay on the Royal Argosy. All went smoothly with the help of Laurie Riley, Facilities Chair, BJ Anderson and Pam Green, Hospitality Chairs, and Mary Turner as Transportation Chair. Prudence Hammett, Carol Henderson, Vicki Neumann, and Judy Thomas kept the tables adorned with flower arrangements. Iris Wagner was the workshop treasurer extraordinaire.

A big round of thanks goes out to all the Seattle Committee members including those not already mentioned: Marilee Ahalt, Nancy Bain, Sue Blethen, Suzette de Turenne, Barbara Feasey, Barbara Hamachek, Kathy Lea, Catherine Parker, Judy Phillips, Charlotte Reed, Juliet Romano, Hope Stroble, Jane Harder and Peggy Wilton. The GCA Position Paper on global warming states:

GCA SUPPORTS STRATEGIES TO SLOW GLOBAL WARMING

"The Garden Club of America recognizes the serious reality of global warming. GCA is committed to preserving the worldwide system of plant diversity, which is increasingly threatened by climate change. Global warming compels GCA to educate its members and the public about the causes and consequences as well as ways in which to respond. Plants form the basis for human life as the producers of oxygen and as the basis of the food chain; without plants, life on earth is not possible."

Recently, I received an email from our Zone XII Conservation Rep, Heidi Ho Conjugacion. In it she says, "...the time is NOW to pass the Climate Bill – and it can be done in this session! Please urge EACH of your members to contact your Senators and encourage them to take a leadership role in the passage of this bill." Her message was timely, as the third GCA Position Paper that I want to highlight concerns global warming and climate change.

It begins with a very strong statement: "The Garden Club of America recognizes the serious reality of global warming." Serious indeed. During the third week of September, the news headlines were all about the U.N. Summit on Climate Change which was aimed at galvanizing governments into action in anticipation of the U.N. Climate Conference in Copenhagen in early December. The goal of the "COP 15", as it is called, will be to "...negotiate a framework on cutting greenhouse gas emissions that will steer the world away from its reliance on fossil fuels." (Financial Times 9/21/09). According to an article in the Financial Times by Fiona Harvey, "Negotiations will be at a national level but the consequences will be implemented largely by sub-national governments. Regional authorities in most nations have control over key issues such as energy generation, transport and enforcement of industrial regulation. The UN Development Program estimates sub-national governments influence 50% to 80% of projects to cut greenhouse gas emissions, rendering meaningless any deal at Copenhagen unless governments put in place necessary structures to ensure commitments are translated into actions at a local level. In other words... it's what we do as individuals in terms of being proactive with our elected officials at the local and state level that really matters. With less going on in the garden at this time of year, I urge you to think of the world as your garden, and the best thing you can do to ensure its health can be as simple as sending an email or making a phone call to your Senators and Congressman.

EcoTips

Every day Seattle's garbage is put on a train and sent to a landfill in Oregon where it will sit forever - 400,000 tons of it, equal to 7,000 train cars each year. Food scraps account for 1/3 of the residential garbage. If you put all your food scraps, coffee grounds and filters, paper towels, napkins and plates into your food and yard waste containers instead of your garbage can, it will be made into compost for our parks and gardens a small but important step to help save our planet.

HORT STARTS

On October 5th, our talented Horticulture committee panel presented bountiful edible examples and growing information about the autumn garden, plus, Garden Club members added their wonderful harvest vegetables for Show and Tell. Our meeting was jam-packed with luscious fruits from the orchard (apples, pears, etc...); farmers' market produce in many surprising colors (merlot lettuce, multicolored radishes and beans, etc...); an in-depth look at our native blackberry and invasive species; anecdotes about our beneficial insects and garden pests; a photographic journey to the Ballard Farmers' Market via the SGC website; and delectable descriptions of some of the finest Harvest cookbooks available. Don't forget to check out our website for harvest recipes!

Our goal for the meeting was to pique members' interest in the many varieties of fresh food offerings from our farmers' markets and emphasize the importance of the beneficial insects that are integral to our food supply. SGC AT WORK IN THE COMMUNITY

In 2006 the SGC gave \$15,000 to the Woodland Park Rose Garden towards building a pergola at the south end of the 2½ acre garden. On September 22nd, members of the SGC and the Committee of 33 (who also made a donation for construction) were invited to help celebrate the completion of the pergola. It frames the south end of the garden with its strong, graceful design made with metal and recycled beams from another Zoo exhibit. The garden itself is in meticulous shape, having had no pesticides for three years and benefitting from one mile of buried drip irrigation. E. J. Hook of the WPZ says of the Rose Garden, it is intended to "...set an example for others to recognize and follow." It does all that and more. Go to the WPZ, stroll through the Rose Garden and you can see one of the best examples of the SGC's work in our community.

GARDENER'S CORNER



Thoughts for November

- Finish planting bulbs, adding bone meal or bulb fertilizer into the planting hole as you prepare the soil. They need water <u>until</u> they bloom. They go dormant in summer. Jonquils are all fragrant!
- Prune and transplant trees and shrubs this month; new roots grow during winter. Dig planting holes just as deep as the root ball, but two to three times as wide. Settle plants just at soil level, not deeper.
- Use mulches to prevent erosion and compaction from rain.
- Take cuttings of rhodies and camellias for propagation; propagate begonias from leaf cuttings.
- Trim chrysanthemums to 4 to 6 inches after they finish blooming.
- Protect built-in sprinkler systems; drain the system, insulate the valve mechanisms.
- Fertilize your lawn with slow-release
 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer
