This summer, while on a drive to Sun Valley with my canine companions in the car, I listened to a great book called, "The Omnivore's Dilemma" by Michael Pollan. It truly changed the way I think about the food that I buy and prepare for my family. A snippet of the review in the Seattle Times read as follows:

"Michael Pollan is a magician...He turns corn and cows, pigs and chickens into a brilliant, eye-opening account of how we produce, market and agonize over what we eat. If you ever thought 'what's for dinner' was a simple question, you'll change your mind after reading Pollan's searing indictment of today's food industry -- and his glimpse of some inspiring alternatives...I just loved this book so much I didn't want it to end."

I couldn't have said it better. And, since the shorter days and longer, colder nights of winter are upon us, it is a good time to stock up on your personal pile of reading books, or gather a few books for gift giving. 
