

CONSERVATION REPORT

Annual Wetherill Clean Up and Potluck '10 on Earth Day!
Please join us on Thursday, April 22nd from 9:30-11:30.





Background on Wetherill for newer members: In 1989 Marjorie Baird (member SGC...and creator of the 'Baird' board!) and her sister Sidonia Foley bequeathed sixteen acres of prime property - originally purchased by their grandfather, Seattle financier Jacob Furth - to the towns of Yarrow Point and Hunts Point to protect, in perpetuity, the land from development and to preserve its wildlife and native plants. The sisters dedicated the Preserve to their mother, Sidonia Furth Wetherill, and their father, Army Colonel, Alexander Wetherill. Marjorie Wetherill Baird died October 30, 2004, at the age of 92.

Directions: The Wetherill Nature Preserve, located between Hunts and Yarrow Point, can be entered from a path leading from NE 33rd Street on Yarrow Point and from the Town Hall and Fairweather Park on Hunt's Point Lane off of 84th Ave NE, Hunts Point, WA.

NAL Highlights

(GCA's annual National Affairs and Legislation Conference):

The conference consists of two full days of learning followed by a morning of meetings that we each prearranged with our legislators or their aides.

The focus this year was on:

- Urging the Senate to pass similar legislation on energy and climate change that was passed by the
 House last summer (HR 2454 America Clean Energy and Security Act). There is a possible new bill being
 generated by Senators Kerry, Graham, and Lieberman this spring. GCA wants to support clean, safe, renewable energy production. The GCA also supports the EPA's budget needs and its ability to regulate
 greenhouse gases under the Clean Air Act.
- Urging legislators to support a possible impending executive order by President Obama to protect, maintain and restore the health of our oceans. (I kept thinking about our symposium last spring!) For more information on this, and a form to send to President Obama showing your support for an executive order, go to: https://secure.nrdconline.org/site/Advocacy?cmd=display&page=UserAction&id=1745 Click on: "Learn more about this issue" for a succinct summary! GCA supports ratification by the US of the United Nations Law of the Sea Treaty. The US is the only country that has not signed it.
- Urging legislators to fully fund the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). LWCF is the premier federal funding source for land conservation. Since it was enacted in 1965, the LWCF has been fully funded only once (during the Clinton years). President Obama is committed to reaching the \$900 million full funding level over the next five years.

We heard from a wide range of speakers: John Broder, reporter for the NY Times, Rob Perks from the NRDC (National Resource Defense Council), two members of the Joint Ocean Commission Initiative, three congressmen, three senators, Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, author Larry Schweiger (and Pres. of National Wildlife Federation)...and my favorite – Gina McCarthy from the EPA. My head is still spinning!

Adding to the spirit of the morning, our refreshment volunteers brought flowers and delicious food for our enjoyment. SGC IN THE COMMUNITY

The grant request made by The Bloedel Reserve was unanimously approved at the February general meeting of the SGC. The request was for \$20,000 to restore and improve their Japanese Garden and surrounding areas. That landscape is overgrown or thinning, paths are inaccessible to some guests and crucial restoration work is needed to return the garden to its former splendor. The initial endowment given by our own former members Virginia and Prentice Bloedel has diminished over the years. The Reserve as a whole is undergoing a change in direction opening with no reservations, engaging the Bainbridge community, sponsoring lectures, concerts and school groups. This is a pivotal time for the Seattle Garden Club to be involved.

I have received hearty thanks from the Associate Director, Edward Moydell and Acting Director, C. David Hughbanks for our grant. They will be keeping us updated as the work (mostly done in-house) proceeds this spring and summer. They look forward to hosting the SGC this fall to celebrate a revitalized and renewed Japanese Garden.



SEATTLE CHILDREN'S PLAYGARDEN

The SGC has received a grant proposal from the Seattle Children's PlayGarden to help with the installation of their final phase of construction: ornamental gardens. The SCPG is Seattle's newest public garden and it's a garden for kids!







Its goal is to improve the lives of all children, especially those with physical or mental disabilities by providing them with full access to a safe indoor/outdoor recreation space and offering inclusive programs that encourage their potential in a beautiful public garden. Whether on two feet, with a walker or wheelchair, and those who communicate differently, all are able to enjoy digging in the dirt, swinging in the sun or chasing butterflies.

The proposal will help with the creation of a living fence that will encircle the entire site, a butterfly border, turf and shade trees, a large urban orchard, planters and a wild zone garden. 

GCA HAPPENINGS

Has over-enthusiasm in the garden this early spring brought aches and pains to your house? Thank GCA for the remedy!!

Like most gardeners, the first blushes of spring in the Pacific Northwest are irresistible and I often find myself digging and clipping, pruning and transplanting with great zest. I am so thrilled to feel the sun on my soggy shoulders and so love to be among the colors of early bulbs and Lenten roses that I ignore my aches or sore back. But when I'm back inside, I often head for the aspirin bottle and maybe a good garden book for the rest of the afternoon!

I was amazed to learn that my aspirin cure is thanks to The Garden Club of America!! The main active ingredient in aspirin is salicyclic acid which derived its name from the salix alba, or the white willow tree, as it is more commonly known. The ancient Aztecs used the bark of that tree to combat fevers and the flu much like we use aspirin today.

In 1931, a manuscript written by two Aztec doctors, educated in Mexico City at the Santa Cruz College, was discovered in the library of the Vatican. The book was written in 1552 and included both Aztec and Latin text as well as illustrations and medicinal uses of flora, including cures for aches and pains. This incredible manuscript was the first known medical text of flora from the western hemisphere. It became known as the Badianus Manuscript. The Garden Club of America recognized the tremendous importance of this writing and presented the very first Founders Fund Award to the Amateur Gardener's Club of Baltimore to assist in the printing of an English version of the manuscript.

Of course aspirin was already popular in the 1930's and the pills can trace roots from other sources. In addition, salicylic acid is no longer made from willow trees. Yet, there is something very soothing to know GCA had a significant role in the history of those tablets we take for gardening soreness!

GARDENER'S CORNER



Thoughts for April

- Finish cleaning up and fertilizing the garden.
 Weed beds, then spread compost
- Check soaker hoses and irrigation systems.
- Bait, bait, bait! A new crop of slugs and snails are already on the march and hungry!
- Mow the lawn, leaving the clippings on the lawn to break down and add nitrogen. Fertilize late in the month using a 3-1-2 ratio slowrelease or a natural organic formulation.
- Plant early outdoor crops of peas, lettuce, beets, leeks, carrots, spinach and onions.
 Also plant heat-loving annuals of cosmos, asters, marigolds, and zinnias.
- Pot up containers of annuals and perennials.
 Be sure to use a slow-release fertilizer.
- Blueberries, roses and vegetable gardens need fertilizer (5-10-10) now. In late April, work the fertilizer into soil where you will be planting dahlias in May.
