GARDENER'S CORNER

Thoughts for May

- Fertilize and trim springblooming shrubs, rhododendron and azaleas, after bloom
- Remove spent bulb seed pods, but leave the foliage to mature
- Plant containers for summer color. Try mixing herbs with annuals. Remember, bees like yellow, hummingbirds like red
- Plant dahlias, calla lilies and other summer-blooming bulbs and tubers
- Transplant heat-loving tomatoes, peppers, squash and cucumbers
- Try espaliering tomatoes on a south or west wall or on a trellis
- Harden off tender plants, flowers and vegetables, before planting them outdoors.
- Renovate lawn if necessary. Aerate and topdress surface with ¼ inch sandy loam soil. Overseed bare spots. A mixture of perennial ryegrass/fine fescue grows well in light shade and can be maintained year round

Five conservation things to think about in May:

1) "Bee" an amateur scientist: check out The Great Sunflower Project!

Four Easy Steps to Participate! | The Great Sunflower Project

Sign up and grow a sunflower (or Bee balm, Cosmos, Rosemary, Tickseed, Purple coneflower or others), describe your garden, observe how long it takes five bees to visit your plant (no longer than 15 minutes), input your results online.



Puget Sound Partnership has been hard at work cleaning up Puget Sound. Check out this page on their website to read about some of their successes. Puget Sound Partnership From Olympia: \$50 million for storm-water projects, and \$42 million to clean up toxic sights in Puget Sound! In D.C.: David Dicks, PSP Executive Director spoke to the Full Committee and Subcommittee on Water and Wildlife Joint Hearing entitled, "Joint Hearing on the Legislative Approaches to Protecting, Preserving, and Restoring Great Water Bodies." Things are happening!

Community Projects Committee and Board Approve Seattle Children's PlayGarden Grant Proposal

The Seattle Children's PlayGarden is Seattle's newest public garden, and is for children of all physical and mental capabilities. A group of SGC members met with the Executive Director, Liz Bullard, and the garden designer, Wendy Welsh, in early April. The proposal is for \$10,000 to help with the final phase of construction of a living fence, butterfly border, turf, shade trees, planters and a wild-zone garden. We learned that special needs children and their siblings will participate in the growing of vegetables, harvesting and cooking in their handicap-friendly kitchen. There is a large physical therapy room, indoor craft space, washer and dryers, chicken coop and rabbit hutch.

Children come from as far away as Monroe and Carnation to participate in summer programs. Indeed, this type of garden is unique and a model for the rest of the country. They rely heavily on volunteers and would love to have our members involved. This will become a must-see for grandchildren!

At its April meeting the Community Projects Committee approved the grant proposal submitted by the Seattle Children's PlayGarden. It was then approved by the SGC Board.
