## **SEED SHARE**

#### AT SHIRLEY MENEICE CONFERENCE

Horticulture chairs and other representatives from GCA clubs throughout the country will gather on October 30<sup>th</sup> at the Huntington Gardens near Pasadena for the annual horticulture conference. Attending this year from SGC will be Jenny Wyatt, Hort Chair, and Angel Clark, Program Chair.

One of the conference's popular activities is a seed exchange. If you have seeds you'd like to swap (no invasives), please contact Jenny or Angel. Put your seeds in a small envelope and label them: Common Name; Botanical Name; Zone Hardiness; and Type of Seed (tree, shrub, perennial, biennial, annual, vine). You'll receive seeds from another GCA member in return.

## **HORTICULTURE STARTS**

Natives are often suggested as the ideal plant choice for many situations, but are there limitations on how we should use them in our gardens? ## Centennial Tree Project Update: A Home for Western Red Cedars

Since 2009, SGC members have been growing *Thuja plicata* (Western Red Cedar) as part of our Centennial Tree Project. Some of the seedlings, planted in Magnuson Park, are by now established and inching their way upward. Others have remained in containers and were displayed as a Class at last spring's Flower Show, Welcome Aboard!

Now comes an opportunity to plant the remaining cedars at the Union Bay Natural Area (UBNA), near the CUH classroom where we hold our meetings. The location, suggested by Fred Hoyt, Associate Director of UWBG and Dr. Kern Erwin, Professor of Plant Ecology, is within the Yesler Swamp Area, between NE 41<sup>st</sup> St and Surber Dr. NE.

Not only is this shady wetland an ideal habitat for the cedars, its added benefit is an active neighborhood group, *Friends of Yesler Swamp*, committed to restoring and preserving this wetland. If you have a cedar and would like to plant it in this area, please contact Jenny Wyatt (<a href="wyattien@comcast.net">wyattien@comcast.net</a>). Bring your cedar to the Hort Meeting on October 3<sup>rd</sup> or drop it off at the nursery at CUH (M-F, between 8-2). David Zuckerman will keep the cedars together in the nursery until the rains start and they can be planted.

If you'd like to be part of planting the cedars, you can join a *Friends of Yesler Swamp* work party, date to be determined.

## **GARDENER'S CORNER**

Thoughts for October:



- Get rid of icky stuff in containers and garden beds.
   Keep after weeds and slug/snails.
- Mulch with compost or manure over roots of roses, azaleas, rhododendrons, rhubarb and asparagus for winter protection.
- Before adding any amendments to your (clay?) soil, get a soil test done. Simple kits to test for pH and major nutrients are available at garden centers. More thorough tests are done at private labs (ask a Master Gardener for a reference) telling current levels of nutrients and advising what amendments to add and in what quantity.
- Thatch, aerate lawns and install sod if needed.
   Top dress with light layer of sifted compost if lawn was planted with little organic matter. Turn off irrigation systems.
- During October and November, after soil temperatures drop below 60 degrees, bulbs of tulips, daffodils, hyacinths, dwarf irises, fritillaries, snowdrops (Galanthus), alliums and crocus should be planted. Add bone meal or bulb fertilizer into the planting hole as you prepare the soil.
- Remember? Tulip bulbs are flat on one side.
   Plant flat side toward the pot side and the leaves will lay over edge instead of in towards center of pot.
- Divide perennials if needed and offer extras to your friends.
- Cut back on watering houseplants and stop fertilizing altogether.
