COMMUNITY PROJECTS

The Community Projects Committee met following the April 2 Horticulture Committee. After thorough review of a proposal from Dunn Gardens to SGC requesting \$4500 for consultation and reforestation of the gardens, the Committee approved the grant. Subsequently, on April 5, the SGC Board approved the grant. It will be submitted to the membership for its vote at the May general meeting on May 17.

The SGC grant of \$2500 in 2011was for "Sustaining the Historical Substance of the Dunn Gardens", listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The Heritage Tree Program included mapping and inventory of the Heritage and Champion trees. SGC funds provided for the biennial testing and documentation of cultural conditions affecting the health of the important garden elements. The study provided an outstanding scientific assessment of trees planted by the Olmstead Brothers in 1915 "to better understand their health and cultural needs". The requested \$4500 will engage consultation and professional expertise to "develop a strategy for eventual replacement and reforestation."

After the May 7 Horticulture meeting at Swanson's Nursery, a guided tour of Dunn Gardens will follow. Please
 try to join in visiting these beautiful gardens.

HORT QUESTION OF THE MONTH

The Volunteer Park Conservatory was built a) in the 1930's with funds from Seattle's first park levy; b) before the Seymour Conservatory in Tacoma and the Golden Gate Park Conservatory of Flowers; c) in 1912 from a pre-fabricated kit shipped from the East Coast.

Answer to April's question is all of the following: Mycotrophic wildflowers are sometimes known as "fungus flowers"; spend most of their lives underground but are not fungi; come in red, yellow, white, pink and brown and are found under thick layers of leaf litter on the forest floor.



On Monday April 30th, boots on and clippers in hand, Seattle Garden Club women visit the Wetherill Nature Preserve to help with annual spring clean-up, as well as learn about the new entrance and accommodations made to garden accessibility as a result of construction on the Eastside's approach to the SR520 bridge. An 'indoor' potluck picnic will be shared in the Hunt's Point Town Hall.

People for Puget Sound's annual luncheon drew a table of Conservation Committee members, organized by Barbie Snapp. We heard from Charles Fishman about the 'Big Thirst" of the world and its water issues, as well as more about the work of People for Puget Sound. Juliet Romano, SGC member and former Conservation Chair, is the star of the featured People for Puget Sound "Lobby Day" video.

"A Bag in Hand"

- Fabric shopping bags help the environment. Single-use plastic shopping bags are harmful; plastic accumulates on land and in the world's oceans. Fully 10% of "Coastal Cleanup" trash collected in 2010 was plastic bags.
- Even if we line our kitchen wastebasket with a large plastic bag, the number of plastic shopping bags consumed is reduced by a significant amount (info from a 20 year RMIT University study in Australia).
- By keeping a supply of fabric bags in the car, it becomes easy to "have a bag in hand!" and be a great conservationist!

GCA SELECTS PLANT OF THE YEAR

Every spring GCA selects a Plant of the Year which receives the Montine McDaniel Freeman award, a tradition since 1995. The focus of the prize is on under-utilized natives this year *muhlenbergia capillaries*, or muhly grass, gulf muhly, or pink hair grass, as it is commonly known. This lovely grass is a native of the sandy alkaline soils of the Gulf Coast and grows throughout the East Coast. It was named for the amateur American botanist, G. Muhlengerg and nominated for the





award by Flordia's Naples Botanical Garden Director. The plant has pinkish spring flowers and rich golden autumnal color as well as delightful year around foliage and enjoys full sun. It can be planted in Pacific Northwest gardens,

although there is ambiguity as to its hardiness here.

Helpful Websites for Spring Cleaning & Water Conservation

- Too many catalogs coming in the mail? To stop unwanted mail, catalogs and phone books go to: https://www.catalogchoice.org/
- How do you wash your car while trying to conserve water? Go to http://www.washwithwatersavers.com/ to locate car washes that have been certified as using 40 gallons or less per car and that return clean water to the environment. (Brown Bear and Costco are on the list for Seattle as are several more car washes around the state.)
- Boycott Bottled Water: It's not just about all that plastic ending up in landfills. Three liters of regular water go into making just one liter of bottled water.
- Join the Meatless Monday movement: http://www.meatlessmonday.com/ Besides the health benefits, you will help save the 1,857 gallons of water that it takes to produce a single pound of beef. (Pork, Chicken and lamb require much less.)
- Moisture gage: Insert a trowel into your lawn. If there's moisture two inches below the surface, it doesn't need watering.
- Check out all the great information at the Seattle Public Utilities website and learn about how to use organic fertilizer: http://www.seattle.gov/util/Services/Yard/MyLawnGarden/index.htm

Natural options (compost, bone meal, peat) add nutrients and promote healthy growth without exposing your plants to the toxic chemicals found in conventional fertilizers, which can seep into the ground and contaminate water supplies (and be tracked in to your house via your shoes which is not good if grandbabies are crawling around on the floor!).

- The list of top selling pesticides in King County is similar to the list of pesticides most commonly found in streams in the Puget Sound basin, including Thornton Creek in Seattle and Mercer Creek in Bellevue.
- King County estimates that 62% of the phosphorus entering Lake Sammamish comes from single-home residential areas; sources include fertilizers and soil wash-off. Excess nutrients promote algae blooms that then decompose and deplete the oxygen needed by fish and other aquatic life. State Dept. of Ecology scientists found 23 pesticides in streams in the Puget Sound region, and found a greater number of pesticides in urban areas than in agricultural areas.

GARDENER'S CORNER

Thoughts for May:



- Till in a thick layer of compost to bedding areas, then sow summer crops and pretty flowers.
- Fertilize rhododendrons, azaleas and roses.
- Bedding plants need regular doses of fertilizer. Avoid too much nitrogen or you'll end up with more leaves than flowers.
- Renovate your lawn if necessary.
- Houseplants can be repotted in fresh soil and slightly larger container if necessary.
- Container care tips: (good reminder from Costco newsletter)
 - 1) Never use a dirty container. Rinse it with ¼ cup chlorine bleach and 1 gallon water. Allow to dry, preferably in the sun.
 - 2) Start with a quality soil mix, not garden or topsoil.
 - 3) Ensure adequate drainage with at least one or more drainage holes in the bottom.
 - Soil tends to dry out quickly in containers. Monitor moisture (drip irrigation) to keep adequately damp.
 - 5) Repot when roots poke out of the drainage hole or when you stick your finger into the soil and it's full of fibrous roots. If reusing the same pot, trim off 25% of the roots, add fresh soil and replace the plant.
- Keep up the weeding and, of course, bait for vou-know-what.
