A Tree is Reborn

One of the Seattle Garden Club's prominent projects in the early days was the 1921 planting of 25 Elm trees along Des Moines Memorial Drive, a major thoroughfare between Seattle and Tacoma, also known as the Road of Remembrance. These trees were planted by white-gloved members in a ceremony honoring WWI soldiers. Eventually 1,100 Elms were planted, representing the number of Washington State soldiers killed in the war. Now most have succumbed to Dutch Elm Disease, age, road expansion and bad pruning. Trees have been replaced by an 84 foot memorial wall with the names of 1,428 dead.



When Susie Ragen and her husband, Brooks, moved into their newly

remodeled home, they ordered a lovely console table from Meyer Wells, a local company that creates furniture from reclaimed urban trees. When they asked the origin of the wood for their table, they discovered that it had been one of those Memorial Drive Elms, rescued and given a new life in their home. How's that for serendipity?

CONSERVATION REPORT

On April 4, five members of the Conservation Committee attended the annual luncheon for People for Puget Sound at the Convention Center. The featured speaker was Charles Fishman. One 'fact' in his talk was that we in the USA spent \$29 billion on water treatment. We American individuals also spend \$21 billion on bottled water per year (that is the equal of four bottles of water per day per person in the USA). We learned a lot and crossed paths with other conservationists. The most proud we were was in the presentation of the "Lobby Day" video that was also shown as part of the program at the SGC May general meeting. For those who may have missed it, the 'star' of that video is the well-spoken, articulate Juliet Romano joined by her SGC cohorts, Sis Woodside and Catherine Roach, as they attend-

ed Lobby Day in Olympia in 2011.

On April 30, a wonderful dozen SGC women tackled the ivy at the Wetherill Nature Preserve. We stepped

nimbly through the wetlands where we vigorously tugged and pried that invasive ivy from the tree trunks. The wind tossed the pretty spring green above our heads, but the preserve, as it nestles in the tuck of Yarrow Bay, was a pleasant work place. A "teddy bear indoor picnic" ('...if you go out in the woods today..') offered a warm, dry shelter from the onset of rain as well as delicious salads and desserts. We wrapped up with each of us taking a turn telling about our most recent garden/conservation activities.

GCA HAPPENINGS

The GardenConservancyAwarded Medal forHistoric Preservation



At GCA's annual meeting in April, The Garden Conservancy was awarded the Medal for Historic Preservation. For over 20 years The Conservancy's endeavor has been to preserve exceptional American gardens. Launched by the horticulturist Frank Cabot, this wonderful organization has assisted over 90 gardens. The Chase Garden in Orting, Washington, is one of The Conservancy's selected preservation projects. This garden which quietly overlooks Mt. Rainier is thought to exemplify a traditional Pacific Northwest style of the mid-twentieth century. In addition, there is a local adjunct, The Garden Conservancy Northwest Network (GCNN), which supports many well known gardens here in the Northwest.

Patti McGee of The Conservancy was also chosen to become an honorary member of The Garden Club. This category in GCA has only been awarded three other times. Patti was recognized for her tremendous support and enthusiasm for gardens, most recently her work at the serene southern garden and laboratory of Elizabeth Lawrence in North Carolina.

We hold one major fundraising event each year...our Holiday Luncheon and Auction, which enables us to grant funds to gardens and parks in the Seattle area. We are passionate about giving back to the community.

One club activity which stands alone without funds from within our club so far is the restoration of East Montlake Park, a tiny park established by the Garden Club and the Army Corps of Engineers in 1959, located along the Montlake Cut...a canal connecting Lake Washington with Lake Union. The park fell into disrepair in later years and was rejuvenated in 2007 with the help of a Partners for Plants grant and countless hours of gardening by club members, plus involvement from several outside groups. Many of the native plants for the park have been propagated by members in workshops and the project continues to be a fun and bonding experience for all.

Our enthusiastic conservation group made its annual trip to the state capitol in Olympia for Lobby Day... a club favorite. There they participated in discussions with state legislators on Clean Puget Sound, Clean Energy and Toxic -Free Kids. Everyone came back energized and determined to make a difference in our world!

The Seattle Garden Club is 95 years young this year...alive and well and looking forward to our Centennial Celebration in 2017.

Attending zone and national meetings is a wonderful way to learn more about our national organization and to meet members from across the country. It is truly an honor to represent SGC. Thank you for the opportunity.

GARDENER'S CORNER

Thoughts for June:

- Move houseplants outdoors for cleaning, grooming, repotting, and summer growth.
- Prune lilacs, forsythia, rhododendrons, and azaleas after blooming.
- Fertilize vegetable garden one month after plants emerge by side dressing alongside the rows.
- Mulch! Applying organic mulch (Cedar Grove Compost is one choice) around plants can cut watering and weeding time. (Some weeds can set more than 300,000 seeds per plant.)
 Get weeds out before they set seed.
- Oh joy, slugs and snails can lay up to 500 eggs per year in the soil. Snails have been known to live for as long as 12 years while slugs generally live 2 years or less. Bait!
- You can plant basil starts late in the month.
 Remember to pinch them back so they fill out.
- Water lawn deeply, or let lawn go dormant and water just once a month. Avoid using fertilizers in hot dry weather.
- Remind thy spouse to sharpen the mower blades.
- Keep hummingbird feeders filled. Wash thoroughly before each refill to prevent mold.
- Enjoy the summer months and the fruits of your labor! You deserve it!
