Dividing Perennials

Divide fall-blooming perennials and bring starts to share at Hort.

The best time for dividing established summer- and fall-blooming perennials is in spring. The easiest way to divide your fall-blooming perennial is to dig the entire root ball, and then use a digging spade to cut the root mass into sections. If the root ball is too thick to cut with a spade, use an old pruning saw. If the roots are delicate and break up easily, a sharp knife is the best choice. Simply cut the sections into three or four smaller, well-rooted divisions. dividing perennials

Conservation Report

"Of all the questions which can come before this nation, short of the actual preservation of its existence in a great war, there is none which compares in importance with the great central task of leaving this land even a better land for our descendants than it is for us." Theodore Roosevelt

President Theodore Roosevelt brought the idea of environmental protection to the national platform in 1905 when he formally established the US Forest Service, and in 1906 when he championed the American Antiquities Act. These two pieces of legislation have provided a significant foundation for the protection of our lands and historical locations around our country.

When you receive this newsletter, Shelley Rolfe and I will be in the last stages of preparing for our National Affairs and Legislation (NAL) trip to Washington D. C., where we will join many other Conservation Chairs and club members from around the country. Our week will be filled with educational speakers and culminate in lobbying our Washington State politicians for the protection of our environment. With the current administration actively undermining existing environmental protections both nationally and internationally, this will be an extremely important week for the Garden Club of America to be heard.

It would be naive and unrealistic to say that we should have never cut any tree, mine any ore or dammed any river. Previous generations didn't know the full consequences of their actions from clear cutting, mining, or throwing waste into their waters. Our natural resources seemed endless and with the lower population, the earth's natural filtration systems were able to manage these changes fairly well...for a while. As horse and carriage gave way to cars, other discoveries were being made; wood preserving creosote was first discovered in 1832, the miracle material of 1907, plastic (Bakelite), the insecticide DDT (1873&1939), and the herbicide Casoron (1950s). All of these discoveries appeared to make crops more prolific, reduce pests and make life easier.

However, with time and increased population, we realized that our resources are finite and chemicals and plastics do have consequences. As a result, we have outlawed certain chemicals and put protections into place for our health and that of our environment.

Now, our administration is attempting to rapidly dismantle the great strides we have made towards protecting our land, oceans and air over these last 112 years. With the denial of climate change, this administration is even planning on pulling out of the Paris Climate Agreement. This is not the direction in which we can allow ourselves to go. On the contrary, we need to be a unified, loud and persistent voice to retain and expand the protections of our environment.

Bearing all this in mind, this year we go to NAL with the strongest demand for environmental protections with more conviction than we ever thought we would need.

We look to you for your support as we promote this message from the Garden Club of America for the environmental protections of our country.

Gardener's Corner

Don't Sing the Blues, Plant Them!

If you asked me what my favorite color was on a summer day, I'd probably say blue. If you asked me right now, on this cold, gray and sodden February day, I'd probably say chartreuse or orange. The truth is, I love all color. Color really affects my mood and yes, science has proven that it can affect your behavior and stress levels too. So, one color I choose for it's calming effect in the garden is blue. Another reason I use blue foliaged plants is because it acts as a perfect foil for other colorful foliage making them "pop."

We use the term glaucus originating from the Greek "glaukos" or bluish green to describe the leaf of a bluish or grayish green foliaged plant. This "blue" comes from cutin which is a wax like material which acts as a water repellent in the wall of some plant cells. Think 'Halcyon' hosta. The more glaucous coating a leaf has, the bluer the appearance. Some plants start out blue only to green out later in the summer. There is no actual true blue pigment in plants, but through cutin, light wave absorption and reflection, blue foliage becomes a possibility.

One fantastic plant to consider to lift the "blues" is the spectacular perennial Crambe maritima. With dramatic curly edged blue foliage, the drought tolerant Blue Sea Kale sports white flowers and sings with a blue flowering agapanthus at it's side or a 'Happy Returns' daylily. I give it a cut-back the beginning of the second week in June when I cut back a lot of my perennial plants to spur on fresh new foliage to last the whole summer through. Another perennial with handsome blue leaves and semi woody stems is the Parahebe perfoliata or Digger's Speedwell. I can't sing the praises of this plant enough....so dependable, so drought tolerant and lovingly odd in an indescribable way. The leaf reminds you of an eucalyptus, but the charming flower is reminiscent of a Veronica. Delicate yet quirky. With a quick cut-back in mid spring I can be assured of fresh new arching stems within weeks. I've combined this little lovely with my favorite orange foliaged grass Carex testacea along with lavenders and Phygelius 'Passionate' – a lust worthy 24-inch black-leaved perennial with orange red flowers in summer. Yum...serious eye candy.

There are lots of bluish foliaged plants to grace your garden adding that sense of calm...conifers, shrubs, perennials and more. Conversely, if you want that visual explosion just combine your blues with purple, yellow and deep salmon toned plants. Blue is like that little black dress in your closet, it makes everything else look good.
