Gardener's Corner by Debbi Wilson

The Queen, the Landscape and the Author

Gardening for the homeowner has evolved for over two hundred years. A few examples of notable events helped shape what we know today.

Re- routing the River Westbourne in London in order to create a large pond in the middle of Hyde Park, Queen Caroline of Anspach, wife of King George II, designed the first man-made pond to look *natural*. It was named the Serpentine, and it remains today.

Capability Brown a genius in natural and creatively built landscapes designed gardens to largely maintain themselves. Sir John Vanbrugh placed the home on the property so that the occupants could view the landscape, rather than the house itself being the view for others. He designed the Folly- a building designed to complete the view and provide a happy spot for the onlooker. During this time, botanists and plant explorers were roaming the world for specimens to bring home. From approximately 1,000 known plant specimens in 1750 to 20,000 specimens in 1850. English nurserymen, with plenty of material, were enjoying a surge in gardening interest from the middle class.

The game changer for ladies, happened when Jane Webb Loudon, published her blockbuster, <u>Practical Instructions in Gardening for Ladies, in 1841.</u> It encouraged women to get their hands dirty and "take on a glow of perspiration." Women could, indeed, manage gardening independent of male supervision.

Follow the simple rules:

Work steadily, not too vigorously

Use light tools

Stand on dry ground, as damp ground unhealthful emanations could rise through the skirts. The author carefully explains what a spade does: "The operation of digging, as performed by a gardener, consists of thrusting the iron part of the spade, which acts as a wedge, perpendicularly into the ground by the application of the foot, and then using the long handle as a lever, to raise up the loosened earth and turn it over."

Today, the garden for women can become a profession, or a hobby, a laboratory, or a demonstration of personal style. Ideally, it is a peaceful place for reflection and enjoyment. Notes taken from At Home, Bill Bryson
