Many thanks to Shelley Rolfe and Barbie Snapp who found our speaker at the NAL Conference in Washington last year and organized a fantastic climate change lecture! Thank you to Iris and her family for funding the Wagner Lecture which brought Kathleen Higgins to the Seattle Aquarium and Seattle Garden Club! What a great way to start the new year. As we embark on February we look forward to our Annual Business Meeting on February I5th planned by the Policy and Planning Committee and chaired by our President Elect Catherine Allan!

The roses and hydrangeas are pruned, the rhodies have started to bloom and we await spring with all its floriferous wonder! For a new rose, I would like to try the fragrant *Rosa* 'Roald Dahl' shrub rose that has peach blooms, a fitting homage to the 'James and the Giant Peach' author. I am thrilled to announce that Megan Smith has made SGC History, in that as far as I know, she is the only

member to nominate a plant for the Freeman Medal and WIN Honorable Mention! The Freeman Medal is the only award that GCA gives to a plant! There is a professional panel that in the past has included Dan Hinckley among others.

Her plant nomination was: *Maianthemum racemosum* (right) commonly known as false Solomon's Seal. Previously, it was known as *Smilacina racemosa*. It is a lovely, extremely hardy 3 season perennial requiring little water. It grows in every U.S. state except Hawaii. It grows in full sun to full shade but you typically see it in the shade in the Pacific Northwest.

The Freeman Medal is presented at the Annual Meeting and we hope Megan can come to accept her award! Stay tuned to



be inspired next month as Megan tells you about the process she went thru to nominate Maiathemum racemosum!

On another note, our GCA President Dede Petri has written to Susanne Tobey the President of the Santa Barbara Garden Club to ask how we can help. I have written to Susanne as well. The stories are heartbreaking as I am sure you have read. Several members of the Santa Barbara Club lost their homes. Please keep them in your prayers as they recover from fire and mud slides. I had no idea that a mud slide could come roaring down the hill at 50 miles per hour. Luckily, our members Alex Morse and Sally Nordstrom survived the fire and the flood. Alex's home was sprayed with fire retardant and now needs to be washed inside and out. The fire melted the plastic in the culverts and they have had to be replaced. Just small examples of what the devastation means.

Gardener's Corner by Debbi Wilson

Vanilla planifolia the Vanilla Orchid produces the only edible fruit of the orchid species. The vanilla orchid is a perennial climbing plant, 8-10 feet in height, with profuse pale yellow green flowers on the vine. Originating in Central America, the orchid has a native pollinator, the melipona bee.

Vanilla orchid requires three years to produce its beans. The flower blooms for only one day; thus, it must be pollinated within 24 hours in order to produce the beans or pods. The vine is grown on trees or poles, then folded down for easier cultivation.

The Totonac tribe in Mexico, first—used vanilla as a flavoring, over 1000 years ago. They created their favorite drink, chocolat, from powdered cacao beans, ground corn and vanilla pods. The vanilla grown in Mexico is considered the most complex and delicate. The Spanish explorer, Cortez, brought vanilla to Europe in the 16th century. The name, vanilla, was derived from the Spanish vaina, meaning pod. Due to favorable growing conditions, the Vanilla planifolia was exported to and cultivated in Madagascar (rich, creamy flavor), Tahiti (floral and fruity) and Indonesia (smoky strong flavor).

Madagascar produces 80% of the world's vanilla, spurred by the package food companies who require natural ingredients. Over the past decade, the price of vanilla has increased six fold, to create a \$1.75 billion market, second only to saffron.

In Madagascar, vanilla production is labor intensive. Since there is no native insect pollinator on the island, the flower must be hand - pollinated. An average worker hand - pollinates I-2,000 flowers per day, within its 24 hour bloom time! After eight months, the almost ripe fruit (brownish pod) is harvested, dipped in hot water to stop the ripening, then sundried for the next five months. Whole or split beans are used to flavor ice cream and custards. The presence of tiny black specs, the sticky seeds in dishes, indicates authenticity. It can be used with seafood, chicken and combines well with cardamom, chili, cinnamon, cloves and saffron.

Since they are now worth \$600 per kilogram, the precious vanilla pods have become the targets of thieves. Farmers in Madagascar have resorted to hiring guards to sleep in their fields to prevent theft of their valuable resource.

The increased demand for natural vanilla has been felt by retailers, who must pay more for their vanilla and pass the cost onto the consumer. The next time you shop for natural vanilla at the store, perhaps you will have a greater appreciation for the plant, and the intense, painstaking labor required to produce that delicious flavoring for you.

Founders Fund Report

The Founders Fund Award is a monetary gift given to a club-sponsored project that undergoes a rigorous and thorough proposal process. Granted annually since 1936, it is the only GCA award that is voted on by the entire GCA club membership. The 2018 finalists have been announced and we will vote on them at our February 15th meeting. All three proposals look excellent and address serious community needs. GCA's help will make a real difference. Briefly, they are:

Roots Rising

This project would fund purchase of a food truck to employ teens in Pittsfield, Massachusetts where half the population is low income. It would expand on a recently-started farming initiative that hires high need youth as crew, to teach preparation of healthy food from locally-sourced produce, build youth culinary and entrepreneurial skills and increase community access to healthy food.

Dunbar Outdoor Kitchen

For over 25 years Dunbar Garden has provided nutritional gardening training on 2 urban acres in Little Rock, Arkansas. Its goal is to preserve the connection between education and the natural world. This proposal would fund a kitchen classroom to teach cooking and food preservation skills in a neighborhood where over 20% of households suffer from food insecurity. Currently Dunbar Garden is constrained by having only an open fire and no running water.

A Therapeutic Garden

This project would transform a concrete courtyard into an easily accessible horticultural therapy garden for 600 residents of Misercordia Home on Chicago's north side. Residents include both adults and children with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The garden would provide hands-on learning experiences and involvement with community and school groups. For forty years Misercordia has provided residents a continuum of care and a broad range of services in the community.

In addition, our own club is working toward submitting a Founders Fund proposal for 2019. SCG has never won this prestigious award and is long overdue! A letter of intent is due May 1st.



GCA Report

The Garden Club of America Hope Goddard Iselin Fellowship in Public Horticulture

Purpose: To further the study of public horticulture through experiential learning that takes place at a recognized public garden, botanic garden, arboretum, or other closely aligned public horticulture institution within the United States.

History: One of the GCA's important early leaders was Hope Goddard Iselin, the first chairman of the Billboard and Roadside Improvement Committee (1922-1931). Mrs. Iselin, a member of the North Country Garden Club, had many interests, including beautifying urban areas through gardens and green spaces, as well as providing opportunities for others to visit natural settings and lovely gardens. Established in 2013 and funded by the Hope Goddard Iselin Foundation, the fellowship honors Mrs. Iselin's contributions to GCA and our communities by advancing the study of public horticulture.

Provisions: Funds one or more students annually at \$5000 for practical research and training at a recognized public garden, botanic garden, arboretum, or other institution directly engaged with connecting people, plants and gardening within the United States.

Eligibility: Open to students enrolled in a graduate-level university program to study public horticulture. Student must confirm ability to conduct research or otherwise utilize facility where study will be undertaken. *Eligibility is open to U.S. Citizens and permanent residents who are enrolled in a U.S. - based institution.*

2017 Recipient:

Leslie Touzeau is a master's student in rural sociology at the University of Missouri in Columbia. Her research examines the life experiences of African-Americans in agriculture. In collaboration with the Mizzou Botanic Garden, she is developing several on campus gardens to honor native Missourian George Washington Carver. The gardens will serve as community growing areas on campus as well as educate students about the roles of marginalized groups in agriculture. Through signage, demonstration plots, and lectures, her project intends to teach the public about the forgotten contributions of minorities and women in building and maintaining our current food system.


March 1st - Come to a party for Friends and Family of SGC members to view our club show photos and floral arrangements at CUH Miller Library from 5-7 PM.
