GCA PROCEDURES FOR VISITING GARDENS

One of your great opportunities as a GCA member is to visit the loveliest private gardens in the world. Procedures for arranging garden visits are as follows:

At least two (2) weeks, if possible, before taking a trip, a member should telephone her Club Chairman for the name, address and phone number of her Zone Visiting Gardens Representative.

The Zone Representative will give the member the name of the Visiting Gardens Club Chairman in the city that she will be visiting.

The member then contacts the Club Chairman and gives the dates of her visit and kinds of gardens of interest to her. If there will be other people with the member (she may bring three non-GCA guests on a garden tour), she should tell the Club Chairman at this time.

The Club Chairman will set up a garden tour and arrange to contact the member when she arrives in the city.

When planning a visit to Hawaii, please make your request four (4) weeks in advance. Also, Mt. Desert GC has specific rules (ask Zone Rep.).

Information for visiting gardens of GCA Courtesy Clubs may be obtained from the Visiting Gardens Committee Zone Representative. The Courtesy Clubs are: Garden Clubs of Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, Jamaica, Bermuda, Bavaria, Uruguay, and New Zealand. There is also a non-GCA contact person in Charleston, South Carolina, as there is no GCA Club in Charleston. Requests to these clubs should be made at least four (4) weeks ahead.

Remember that the Visiting Gardens Committee does not authorize using any Visiting Gardens privileges for professional purposes, i.e., for professional photography or for articles to be professionally published.

A Brief History of the Seattle Garden Club 1917-1998

The Seattle Garden Club was founded in 1917. For a few informal years we could make our own rules, such as summers-only memberships, even a few gentlemen members. The Garden Club of America tightened us up when we affiliated in 1923. In spite of our ever-after obligation to conform to *their* rules, we have been more than compensated by the many joys of association. We are among 189 clubs thus associated. Regional and national meetings, visits from national and regional officers and other experts, and mutual projects with Portland and/or Tacoma have led to delightful encounters with like-minded persons, and even to lifelong friendships. We have proudly contributed a fair share of regional and national officers too.

Each generation of members has produced enthusiastic and generous individuals who have generated magnificent horticultural enhancements for Seattle, and who have given our Club all the credit. Most of their names can be found on our list of medalists; and because of them, we can truthfully boast that Seattle has become a more beautiful city because this Club exists. Furthermore, the wonderful generosity of three of our members, during the past few years, has resulted in three horticultural gifts to the whole world: Lakewold in Tacoma, the Wetherill Preserve in Bellevue, and the Bloedel Reserve on Bainbridge Island.

Along Des Moines Way still remain a few of the 1,200 elms memorializing soldiers lost in World War I, a project we sponsored in 1921. Also surviving are some of the pink dogwoods we gave to the University of Washington campus in 1925, and most of the flowering crabapples, honoring George Washington's Bicentennial, which we planted on the north shore of Greenlake in 1932. The University's Arboretum, whose design by Olmsted Brothers of Boston we commissioned in 1934, continues to flourish, in spite of a setback caused by the terrible destruction wrought by the winter of 1990-91. We have always been a faithful collective annual contributor, with special emphasis on Azalea Way. In 1984 we donated \$50,000 toward the Arboretum's exceedingly attractive and heavily used Donald Graham Visitor's Center. In 1985 we gave \$25,000 to the University's Center for Urban Horticulture; and in return the University has given us a room at the Center for our very own use - a boiled-down but adequate surrogate for the headquarters building for which earlier members hoped and saved.

Our still-extant plantings of 1930 on each side of Aurora Avenue as it cuts through Woodland Park came about after we lost the battle to save the Park from being cut at all. We have won a few battles too, such as saving the south shore of Shilshole Bay from developers and for the present pretty park; and helping to create the linear Burke-Gilman Trail Park from an abandoned railroad right-of-way. We have encouraged "pocket parks," freeway planting, wilderness preservation, and bird sanctuaries. We have donated our funds and our enthusiastic interest not only to Lakewold and the Wetherill Preserve, but also to the gardens at the Lighthouse for the Blind, Home of the Good Shepherd, Burke Museum, and the Species Rhododendron Garden at Weyerhaeuser's corporate headquarters in Federal Way. In 1959 we initiated and helped to fund the beautification of the Lake Washington Ship Canal. We are still involved, especially in the Carl English gardens at the Government Locks.

We have contributed to conservation education through teachers' summer work-shops, field trips for members, the Student Conservation program in our national parks, and distributing the excellent G.C.A. Conservation Packet to every grammar school in Seattle. We also gladly participate in the G.C.A. Exchange (with England) Fellowship. We firmly ally ourselves with other conservation-dedicated groups in recycling, and in trying to protect the wildflowers, the wetlands, the wildlife and, in short, the best interests of this planet.

We have presented many horticultural and flower-arranging speakers, classes, and competitive exhibits, for our own and the public's education and pleasure.

Our Club has served as host for two national G.C.A. meetings, in 1930 and 1977; for two Zone XII meetings, in 1968 and 1994; and a national Board of Associates meeting in May of 1991.

In 1992 we collaborated with the Pacific Science Center to produce at the Center a marvelous Beatrix Potter exhibit, straight from England. Mr. McGregor's vegetables and watering can, for instance, were scaled as large as they would appear to Peter Rabbit. Delights abounded. For the first weekend of the three-month exhibit, we staged a competitive flower show in among it all, including a profitable preview party.

In May of 1995 our Club staged a Club Flower Show, "Secret Gardens," at the homes of Mrs. James C. Pigott and Mrs. William G. Reed.

At the Annual Meeting in June of 1997 the Seattle Garden Club celebrated its "Eightieth Year."

In 1998 and 1999 the Seattle Garden Club sponsored an award at

the Northwest Flower and Garden Show. Three Judges from our Club judged and made the award, "Au Naturel," to the garden best displaying a naturalistic design.

In 1998 we entered the Vignette category of the Northwest Flower and Garden Show. Talented members created an entryway with the theme "Our Scandinavian Heritage" – and we won a blue ribbon!

In April 1999, we held a Small Flower Show "ZOOBOTANICA" at the Woodland Park Zoological Gardens. It featured seven horticulture and six floral classes. We won the Beattie, Puckett, and Crammond Awards. Three of our members won GCA Awards for Best in Show, Flower Arranging, Horticulture, and Photography. "ZOOBOTANICA" also received Judges' Commendations for both the schedule and staging – rare indeed. We also received five Judges' Commendations for floral and horticulture classes. The preview cocktail party was fabulous and was even graced with a life-size papier-mâché zebra!

SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB CIVIC PROJECTS

1921

"The Highway of a Thousand Elms" was the Club's first major civic project. 1200 Elm Trees were planted along Des Moines Way, the then "new highway" between Seattle and Tacoma. Each tree was in memory of a Washington State soldier killed in World War I.

1925

Planted 600 Lombardy Poplars along the road to The Highlands Planted 100 pink Dogwoods on the University of Washington campus and dedicated a bench, designed by Carl Gould, to Mrs. Horace Henry in a campus garden area called Island Grove

1930

Planted a Lawson Cedar on the grounds of St. Mark's Cathedral Planted 200 flowering Crabapples and American Elms and Oaks along the north shore of Green Lake in honor of George Washington's Bicentennial

Rhododendron planting in the Arboretum in honor of Mrs. Frank Reed

1946

Tree planting at Yesler Terrace

BY-LAWS OF SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB, INC. REVISED JUNE 2000

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this corporation shall be SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB, INC.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTS AND PURPOSES

The objects and purposes of the corporation shall be to stimulate the knowledge and the love of gardening, to aid in the protection of the quality of the environment, to encourage and assist in civic beautification, and to aid and carry on charitable, scientific and educational activities in all of the said fields.

The corporation may lease, purchase, receive by deed, devise or bequest, possess and dispose of all such real and personal property as may be necessary or convenient to carry out the objects and purposes of the corporation, and may borrow money for all lawful corporate purposes, and execute and deliver its notes, bonds or other evidences of indebtedness therefore, and may secure the repayment of any such loans, with interest, by a mortgage upon or pledge of all or any part of its real or personal property.

In the event of the dissolution of this corporation, all of its assets shall be donated to a non-profit corporation or corporations having objects and purposes similar to those of this corporation and no part of such assets may inure to the benefit of any member or other individual.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership shall include the following classes of members: Active, Provisional, Sustaining and Non-resident: and may include, at the discretion of the Governing Board, the following classes of members: Honorary, Honorary Life, and Inactive. All members shall be elected by the Governing Board.

Section 2. Active Members.

A. Nominations for Active membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chairman of the Membership Committee from Provisional members having the following qualifications:

1. At least two years of Provisional membership.

2. Residence in Seattle or environs.

3. Possession of and active participation in the work of a garden or demonstrated knowledge of and interest in horticulture, flower arranging, or landscape design.

Demonstrated ability and willingness to cooperate in committee work and in the advancement of civic, cultural, horticultural, charitable, scientific and educational interests of the community.

B. Active Members shall be elected by the Governing Board.

C. Active members shall also be members of the Garden Club of America.

D. Active members shall be qualified to hold office, to vote on all Club matters at meetings, to propose or second new Provisional members, and to participate in matters pertaining to the Garden Club of America.

Section 3. Provisional Members.

A. Nominations for Provisional membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chairman of the Membership Com-

mittee and shall be approved by the Governing Board.

B. Candidates for Provisional membership shall possess a garden; shall work in or direct a garden; shall demonstrate knowledge of and interest in horticulture, flower arranging or landscape design. They shall be willing to share actively in the work and responsibilities of the Club and shall attend Horticulture classes and General Meetings for the first two years on a regular basis.

C. Provisional members are on a provisional basis for a minimum of two consecutive years and no longer than three years unless approved by the Governing Board. Failure to comply with requirements means forfeiture of membership, including acceptance fee and

dues.

D. Provisional members may vote on Club matters, with the exception of changes to by-laws. However, they may neither hold office, nor be a member of the Governing Board, nor propose new members, nor participate in the privileges of the Garden Club of America.

Section 4. Sustaining Members.

A. Members who have completed ten years of satisfactory service as Active members may, upon written request to the Membership Chairman, be granted Sustaining membership at the discretion of the Governing Board.

 B. Sustaining members shall retain their membership in and privileges of the Garden Club of America.

C. In the Seattle Garden Club, Sustaining members may vote, exhibit at flower shows, and propose candidates for membership. They may not hold office although they may serve on committees.

Section 5. Non-resident Members.

A. Any Active member in good standing no longer residing in Seattle and environs may become a Non-resident member. Such members pay dues and shall have the general status and rights of a member.

B. A Non-resident member, upon returning to Seattle, may be reinstated to her previous classification, with the approval of the Governing Board and without payment of an entrance fee.

Section 6. Honorary Members.

A. Honorary members may from time to time be chosen from within or without membership of the Club. Such members shall be elected by the affirmative written vote of the entire Governing Board in recognition of outstanding service to the Club or to the community.

B. This class of membership shall be exempt from dues and shall not have Active membership responsibilities or status.

Section 7. Honorary Life Membership.

A. The Governing Board shall designate as Honorary Life members those Active, Sustaining or Non-resident members who have been dues paying members of the Seattle Garden Club for fifty years. Such Honorary Life members shall retain the privileges of the class of membership from which they were transferred. They shall be exempt from dues and assessments provided, however, that Honorary Life members who wish to retain their membership in the Garden Club of America shall pay such dues as are required by that organization.

Section 8. Inactive Membership

A. The Inactive membership shall consist of any member who has been in good standing but due to ill health or physical disability is unable to participate in the Seattle Garden Club's activities. To remain on the roster that person, or her representative, may request permission in writing to become an Inactive member. An Inactive member shall pay no dues to either the Seattle Garden Club or to the Garden Club of America and shall not enjoy the privileges of the Club. This status shall require a unanimous vote of the Board and, once granted, will be deemed permanent.

Section 9. Resignation and Reinstatement.

A. The resignation of any member shall be made to the Member-

ship Chairman in writing and shall, at the discretion of the Governing Board, take effect only upon the discharge of all indebtedness to

the Club by the resigning member.

B. Members who have resigned in good standing may be reinstated with an affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. They shall resume their previous classification of membership.

ARTICLE IV.

ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT AND GOVERNING BOARD

Section 1.

A. The President, with the approval of the Governing Board, shall appoint from the Active membership a Nominating Committee Chairman and four committee members. The Nominating Committee shall nominate from the Active membership the Officers, with the exception of the Vice-President, and the Chairmen of the Standing Committees. The Nominating Committee shall make its report to the Governing Board at its regular meeting in March, and a copy of this report shall be mailed to each member of the Club two weeks prior to the Annual Meeting. The slate shall be voted on at the Annual Meeting.

B. Additional candidates for President and for the Governing Board may be nominated providing that in each case the nomination, endorsed by ten Active members, be presented in writing to the Recording Secretary not less than seven days before the Annual

Meeting.

C. All elections shall be by majority vote.

D. All members of the Governing Board shall serve for two years.

ARTICLE V. GOVERNING BOARD

Section 1. All affairs of the Club shall be managed by the Governing Board consisting of the Officers and the Chairmen of the Standing Committees.

Section 2. The Officers of the Club shall consist of President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary and Treasurer.

A. The President shall preside at all General, Board and Executive Meetings. She shall, with the approval of the Governing Board, appoint from the Active membership the Chairman of the Nominating Committee and four committee members; the Chairmen of all Special Committees; any ad hoc committee to serve as needed; del-

egates to GCA Annual and Zone Meetings; delegates for all other purposes – National or Community Meetings etc. With the Membership Chairman, she shall select the Membership Committee.

B. The Vice-President shall be appointed by the President from members of the Governing Board. She shall preside at Board Meetings in the absence of the President and shall assist as requested by the President.

C. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Club under the direction of the President and serve as the Yearbook Chairman.

D. The Recording Secretary shall record minutes at all Board and Executive Meetings and send said minutes to Board Members and appropriate GCA and Zone Officers. She shall compile and send to the membership any additional information deemed necessary.

E. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee and shall have custody of all funds, properties and securities of the SGC with the exception of the Endowment Fund which shall be placed, for investment purposes, with professional management outside the SGC. The Treasurer's duties shall be subject to regulations as may be imposed by the Governing Board. Yearly budget requests shall be submitted by Committee Chairmen to the Treasurer who, with the Finance Committee, is responsible for preparing the budget and presenting it to the Board in May of each year.

Section 3. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of Officers of the Club. It shall have all the powers of the Governing Board between meetings. Any action taken by the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Governing Board at its next meeting.

Section 4. Members of the Governing Board shall serve as Chairmen of the following Standing Committees:

Civic Activities
Conservation
Finance
Flower Arrangers
Horticulture
Meeting Arrangements
Membership
Program
Public Gardens
Public Relations
Ways and Means

Section 5. The Membership Committee shall be selected by the President and the Membership Chairman from the Active membership and with approval of the Governing Board. Section 6. Special Committee Chairmen and Ad Hoc Committees, as the need arises, shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Governing Board. Each Chairman shall report to the Board on a regular basis or as requested during her Chairmanship.

A. Flower Show Chairman shall be nominated by members of the judging program and said nomination shall be submitted to the Governing Board for approval. She shall report to the Governing Board on a regular basis.

Section 7. Vacancies in offices or on the Governing Board shall be filled for the remainder of the term by the Governing Board.

Section 8. The Governing Board shall meet monthly unless otherwise ordered by the Governing Board.

ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS

Section 1. There shall be regular monthly meetings from October through June.

Section 2. There shall be an Annual Meeting in June, on a date to be specified by the Governing Board, at which the members shall vote for President and members of the Governing Board.

The results of the election shall be announced; annual reports shall be made; the activities of the Club shall be discussed; awards shall be presented and new Provisionals and Actives are introduced.

At the Annual Meeting or any meeting where the transaction of business requires the vote of the members, a quorum shall be a majority thereof who shall be present in person. All elections shall be by majority vote.

Section 3. All meetings of the Club and of the Board of Governors shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VII. FEES, DUES, FISCAL YEAR AND BUDGET

Section 1. The acceptance fees for Active and Provisional members shall be determined by the Governing Board.

Section 2. All dues shall be determined by the Governing Board and shall be payable annually in advance of July 1. Any member who is delinquent in the payment of dues on August 1 shall receive a notice by certified mail, return receipt requested. If such dues are

not paid by September 1, membership shall be forfeited.

Section 3. If the various assessments levied during a fiscal year are not paid by a member by the end of that fiscal year, membership shall be forfeited.

Section 4. The fiscal year of the Club shall be June 1 through May 31.

Section 5. The budget shall be prepared by the Finance Committee, chaired by the Treasurer, and shall be presented to the Governing Board. Necessary adjustment of, or additions to, the budget may be made by the Governing Board at any time thereafter.

Section 6. Any proposed expenditure in excess of \$2,000, approved by the Governing Board and not included in the budget, must be approved by the membership.

ARTICLE VIII ENDOWMENT FUND

Section 1. There shall be a SGC Endowment Fund which shall be separate from all SGC operating funds, and shall be placed, for investment purposes, with professional management outside the SGC.

ARTICLE IX DELEGATES

Section 1. The President and a delegate appointed by the President and approved by the Governing Board shall attend the Annual Meeting of the Garden Club of America. Should the President be unable to attend, an alternate shall be designated by the Governing Board.

Section 2. The Garden Club of America Annual Meeting registration fees, travel expenses and room reservation of the President or her alternate and of one delegate shall be borne by the Seattle Garden Club and limited by financial policy.

Section 3. Delegates for all other purposes – Zone Meetings, Community Meetings, etc. – shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board. The expenses shall be borne by the delegates.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any meeting of the membership of this Club by a majority vote of the Active and Sustaining members present, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to each such member two weeks prior to the date of the meeting.

Section 2. Recommendations for changes may come from the Governing Board when approved by vote of ten members of the Governing Board or on the written proposal of not less than twenty-five Active members.

POLICIES OF SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB, INC. JUNE 2000

MEMBERSHIP POLICIES

I. The Membership Committee shall be selected by the President and the Membership Chairman. The Committee shall be composed of six members, two selected each year for a three year term; two alternates are selected to serve a one year term. For purposes of voting, a quorum of the Membership Committee must be present. Balloting shall take place at the last meeting prior to the presentation of the list of candidates to the Governing Board. A separate written ballot shall be cast for each candidate. The Chairman does not vote.

II. Admission to Membership

Section 1. Election to Active Membership.

A. Nominations for Active membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chairman of the Membership Committee.

B. Election to Active membership from Provisional status shall require the affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. Votes may be cast in person or by proxy. A separate written ballot shall be cast for each candidate.

C. Upon election of any candidate to Active membership, the Corresponding Secretary shall send a formal invitation to the candidate. Such membership shall become effective upon written acceptance of the invitation and payment of an acceptance fee and the first year's dues.

Section 2. Proposal for Provisional Membership.

A. Candidates for Provisional membership shall be proposed and seconded by Active or Sustaining members, none of whom shall be members of the Membership Committee, relatives, or relatives by marriage.

B. Proposal for membership shall be made to the Membership Chairman on forms furnished by the Chairman. Forms must be post-

marked no later than midnight November 30.

C. Candidates shall be personally known to four members of the Governing Board and/or Membership Committee. Names shall represent at least one from each.

 D. An Active or Sustaining member may propose or second only one candidate each year.

E. A candidate who fails two times to pass the Membership Com-

mittee or the Governing Board may not be proposed again.

F. The number of new Provisional members shall be determined by the Governing Board.

Section 3. Election to Provisional Membership

A. The Membership Committee shall carefully consider each

candidate proposed for Provisional membership.

B. At the March meeting of the Governing Board, the Membership Chairman shall present for consideration the names of those candidates recommended by the Membership Committee for Provisional membership.

C. Election to Provisional membership shall take place at the April meeting of the Governing Board. Election shall require the affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. Votes may be cast in person or by proxy. A separate written ballot shall be cast

for each candidate.

D. Upon election of a candidate to Provisional membership, a formal invitation shall be sent by the Corresponding Secretary. A letter from the President and a letter from the Membership Chairman shall immediately follow. Membership shall become effective upon written acceptance of the invitation and upon payment of an acceptance fee and the first year's dues. Response and fees shall be sent to the Corresponding Secretary by a date decided by the Governing Board.

E. The Membership Chairman shall notify the proposer and the seconder of the candidate of the decision of the Governing Board and of their responsibilities for the new Provisional member.

III. By the January Board Meeting, the Board shall discuss and vote on the maximum number of new members to be invited to membership. This number shall include transfers.

TRANSFER POLICIES

I. Transfer from Seattle Garden Club

 A member who becomes non-resident and is a member in good standing of the Seattle Garden Club may request a letter from the Seattle Garden Club President to be sent to the President of the Club in her new community.

The policies of the Club in the member's new community shall determine whether or not she is invited to membership there.

II. Transfer into the Seattle Garden Club

 A transfer shall reside in the Seattle area a minimum of one year.

2. A letter shall be written by the President of the transfer's former

Garden Club of America Club stating that the candidate is a member

in good standing.

3. The transfer shall be proposed by an Active or Sustaining member of the Seattle Garden Club who knows her well. Names of at least three other members who also know her shall be included in the letter or proposal.

4. The transfer shall have attended some meetings of the Seattle Garden Club and understand our purpose and how we operate.

5. The Seattle Garden Club Membership Committee shall oversee the application process for transfer members, who shall enter the Seattle Garden Club as Sustaining members.

6. For a Sustaining Transfer to become an Active member, certain Provisional requirements shall be completed within a two year time period. The Membership Committee shall then consider the application to be for Active membership.

7. A maximum of two members in this category may be consid-

ered in a year.

FINANCIAL POLICIES

I. Accounts

1. The funds of the SGC are accounted for under three separate headings: Administrative, Meeting Arrangements and the Project and Charitable Account.

2. Membership dues and fees are credited to the Administrative Account, Expenditures from the Administrative Account include GCA expenses and expenses for officers, committees, the office,

and speakers.

3. Meeting Arrangements fees and General Meeting individual fees are credited to the Meeting Arrangements Account. Expenditures from the Meeting Arrangements Account include food, beverages, room rental, and valet parking expenses for General Meetings. The Meeting Arrangements Account should maintain a minimum balance of \$3,000 and be self-supporting.

4. Fund-raising income, flower show income, special project income and endowment distributions (pay-out) are credited to the Project and Charitable account unless otherwise directed by the Governing Board. Expenditures from the Project and Charitable Account shall be used to support the mission of the SGC including: membership in or contributions to other organizations, fund-raising expenses, flower show expenses and special project expenses.

5. Endowment distributions (pay-out) may be accumulated for a future project or returned to the Endowment at the discretion of the

Governing Board.

6. Excess funds which accumulate in all SGC accounts may be invested in a safe instrument upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee and approval of the Governing Board.

II. The Endowment Fund

1. The Endowment Fund shall provide a permanent source of funding to support the purposes and mission of the SGC.

As an endowment fund only the distribution (pay-out) will be

used each year.

- 2. All contributions, memorials and bequests received shall be credited to the Endowment Fund unless otherwise specified by the donor.
- 3. The Endowment Fund will be managed by The Seattle Foundation with the Treasurer as liaison to The Seattle Foundation.

4. The Endowment Fund may be the designated recipient of con-

tributions made in tribute to others.

5. Gifts may be made in the form of direct cash contributions or appreciated property. The President of SGC shall be responsible for providing appropriate acknowledgment.

6. Gifts may be made directly to the Seattle Garden Club En-

dowment Fund at the Seattle Foundation.

III. Reports and Review

1. A financial report shall be submitted to the Governing Board by the Treasurer in June, September, December, and March of each fiscal year or upon request of the President.

2. An annual financial report shall be submitted to the member-

ship by the Treasurer at the Annual Meeting in June.

- 3. The immediate Past-Treasurer and the President shall review Seattle Garden Club finances at least once annually in June before the Annual Meeting.
- 4. The Finance Committee will review the Endowment Fund annually including performance, fees and pay-out.

IV. General

1. An individual project over \$5,000 or a project that would cause the fiscal year total of all projects to exceed \$10,000 must be approved both by the Governing Board and by the membership.

2. All requests to the Treasurer for reimbursement or payment should be accompanied by a receipt and a reimbursement form.

3. Reimbursement of Garden Club of America Annual Meeting fees and expenses shall be limited to a maximum of \$1,000 per person for a maximum of two people.

4. Signature cards for all checking/savings and investment ac-

counts should be updated each June.

5. All restricted gifts to SGC will be reviewed by the Board and accepted or rejected on a case-by-case basis, based on the appropriateness to SGC purposes and goals as well as to the possible tax consequences.

V. Dues and Acceptance Fees

 Membership dues are \$115 per year for Sustaining, Active, and Provisional members, including Transfers into the SGC. Dues for Non-Resident members are \$75. Honorary Life members do not pay dues.

2. The Seattle Garden Club pays the Garden Club of America \$35 per member for all members, including Honorary Life, with the exception of Provisional members for whom the payment is \$10

each.

 Meeting Arrangements fees are \$100 per year and required from Active and Provisional members. Meeting Arrangements fees are optional for Honorary Life and Sustaining members.

4. The acceptance fee for Provisional members is \$125. Upon acceptance into Active member status there is an additional fee of

\$50

The acceptance fee for members transferring into the Seattle Garden Club is \$125.

CIVIC ACTIVITIES

I. Requests received from the Community for \$1000 and over are sent to the Civic Activities Committee for evaluation.

II. Recommendations for funding made by the Civic Activities Committee shall be approved by the Governing Board.

III. Guidelines for Major Seattle Garden Club Projects
