A Brief History of the Seattle Garden Club 1917–2016

The Seattle Garden Club was founded in 1917 For a few years we could make our own rules, such as summer-only memberships, and even accepted a few gentlemen members. When we affiliated with The Garden Club of America in 1923, we became a more formal club. In spite of our ever-after obligation to conform to their rules, we have been more than compensated by the many joys of association among 200 clubs. Regional and national meetings, visits from national and regional officers and other experts, and mutual projects with Portland and/ or Tacoma have led to delightful encounters with like-minded persons, and even to lifelong friendships. We have proudly contributed a fair share of regional and national officers too.

Each generation of members has produced enthusiastic and generous individuals who have generated magnificent horticultural enhancements for Seattle, and who have given our Club all the credit. Most of their names can be found on our list of medalists; and because of them, we can truthfully boast that Seattle has become a more beautiful city because this Club exists. Furthermore, the wonderful generosity of three of our members over the years, has resulted in three horticultural gifts to the whole world: Lakewold in Tacoma, the Wetherill Preserve in Bellevue, and the Bloedel Reserve on Bainbridge Island.

A few of the 1,200 elms along Des Moines Way still remain, memorializing soldiers lost in WWI, a project we sponsored in 1921. Also sur-

viving are some of the pink dogwoods we gave to the University of Washington campus in 1925, and most of the flowering crabapples, honoring George Washington's Bicentennial, which we planted on the north shore of Greenlake in 1932. The University's Arboretum, commissioned by SGC in 1934 and designed by Olmsted Brothers of Boston, continues to flourish. And the SGC maintains its consistent support of the University of Washington.

Our still extant plantings of 1930 on each side of Aurora Avenue as it cuts through Woodland Park came about after we lost the battle to save the Park from being cut at all. We have helped save the south shore of Shilshole Bay and helped create the present park, and the linear Burke-Gilman Trail Park from an abandoned railroad right-of-way. We have encouraged "pocket parks", freeway planting, wilderness preservation, and bird sanctuaries. We have donated our funds and our enthusiastic interest not only to Lakewold and the Wetherill Preserve, but also to the gardens at the Lighthouse for the Blind, Home of the Good Shepherd, Burke Museum, and the Species Rhododendron Garden at Weyerhaeuser's corporate headquarters in Federal Way. In 1959 we initiated and helped to fund the beautification of the Lake Washington Ship Canal. We are still involved, especially in the Carl English gardens at the Government Locks.

We have contributed to conservation education through teachers' summer work-shops, field trips for members and the Student Conservation program in our national parks. We also gladly participate in the GCA Exchange (with England) Fellowship, and support the Conservation Pledge of the Garden Club of America (see page 3).

We have presented many horticultural and floral design speakers, classes, and competitive exhibits, for our own and the public's education and pleasure.

Our Club has served as host for two national GCA meetings, in 1930 and 1977; for two Zone XII meetings, in 1968 and 1994; and a national Board of Associates meeting in May of 1991.

In 1992 we collaborated with the Pacific Science Center to produce a marvelous, three month Beatrix Potter exhibit at the Center, straight from England. And we staged a competitive flower show during that first weekend of the opening.

In May of 1995 our Club staged a Club Flower Show, "Secret Gardens", at the homes of Mrs. James C. Pigott and Mrs. William G. Reed.

In 1998 and 1999 The Seattle Garden Club sponsored an award at the Northwest Flower and Garden Show. Three judges from our Club judged and made the award, "Au Naturel", to the garden best displaying a naturalistic design.

In 1998 we entered the Vignette category of the Northwest Flower and Garden Show. In "Our Scandinavian Heritage" category we won a blue ribbon.

In April 1999, we held a Small Flower Show "Zoobotanica" at the Woodland Park Zoological Gardens.

In 2000, the SGC Endowment Fund was established at the Seattle Foundation with a contribution of \$70,000.

In 2001 and 2002, the SGC continued its community support through contributions to the

establishment of a Community Park at Planned Parenthood, funds to refurbish the Entry Shade Garden at CUH, the Healing Garden at Cancer Lifeline, and the rare plant collection at CUH.

In the fall of 2002 we had "Raising the Roof", a Small Flower Show held at the Center for Urban Horticulture. Proceeds raised from the Preview Party were donated to help rebuild CUH after the ecoterrorist attack. Donations from SGC members were 100%.

There have been several Club Flower, Horticulture & Photography Shows in conjunction with the Annual Meetings held at Broadmoor Golf Club.

2004 – "Swinging in the Spring"

There was great participation, learning and help in preparing for our Small Flower, Horticulture & Photography Show in 2007.

Our Auction at the Christmas Luncheon continues to raise more funds every year for our Community Projects. Depending on our table creations done by our members, they are sometimes distributed to various non-profit agencies around the city. The 2005 Auction raised the most ever at \$38,492.

In 2004 a new committee called Policy & Planning was formed for the purpose of long range planning for our club. It was made a Standing Committee in 2005, and as of June 2010 the President-Elect chairs the committee.

A special fundraiser called "Blooms & Glass" was held in May 2006 in the gardens of member

Diana Neely. This was a huge and magical installation of glass pieces by world renowned glass artist Dale Chihuly. The Seattle Garden Club was able to raise over \$27,000 at this once-inalifetime event.

In 2005 two generous gifts of \$30,000 each were given to The Seattle Garden Club, managed in two separate accounts at the Seattle Foundation.

The first is the Pamela Green Speaker Fund for nationally recognized Horticulture speakers at major club events. This gift is in honor of three generations of the Joshua Green family who have served as President of the SGC.

The second is the Iris Wagner Conservation Leadership Fund for nationally recognized Conservation speakers. The purpose of this fund is to encourage speakers for the SGC focusing on general issues of conservation.

The Seattle Garden Club website was created to increase our communication capabilities and it continues to be updated. Many members receive their Newsletter by e-mail and it is available online.

SGC has a long history of supporting Community Projects, as listed on the next pages. And, due to an extremely prosperous year in 2005/06 the membership voted for a larger Community Project. We pledged \$50,000 to the Seattle Art Museum for the Seattle Vivarium Nurse Log in the SAM Olympic Sculpture Park, payable over three years.

On May 18-19, 2007, the GCA flower show "It's Magic" was held at the UWBG and earned Judges' Commendations for hospitality, sched-

ule, staging and the Conservation Exhibit.

In 2007, The Seattle Garden Club refurbished the former Entry Garden at UWBG and renamed it the SGC Fragrance Garden. The University of Washington awarded The Seattle Garden Club with Benefactor Status which signifies over \$100,000 has been given to the UWBG/Arboretum by SGC. During the award ceremony Bruce Bare, the Dean of the School of Forest Resources, spoke of SGC's long history with UWBG. Then bagpipes led us into the garden for the ribbon cutting with Mayde Anderson, Joey Hazen and Sylvia Duryee, followed by a festive lunch.

We celebrated our 90th Anniversary at the Annual Meeting in June with a festive luncheon. We honored the Past Presidents, Honorary Life Members and enjoyed a video on "Then & Now".

On January 15, 2009, the SGC hosted the very successful Fergus Garrett Lecture at the Asian Art Museum. On May 11 the Iris Wagner Conservation Lectureship Fund made possible an educational symposium: TOWARD A HEALTHY PUGET SOUND with William Ruckelshaus as the moderator for the panel discussion.

In 2009 we reached an agreement with CUH to renew our office lease for ten more years and also renewed our three-year maintenance agreement for the Fragrance Garden.

The GCA's 100th Birthday was celebrated in 2013 and clubs were asked to participate in their nationwide project called "2013 Preserving the Past, Growing the Future: Theme Trees, Our Living Legacy". For the GCA's Centennial Tree Project the SGC chose the Thuja plicata (Western Red Cedar) and Amelanchier alnifolia (Pacific

Serviceberry) – both highly valued in Northwest Native American culture.

Since 2009 SGC members have been growing these trees as part of our Centennial Tree Project. Half of the cedar seedlings planted at Magnuson Park are now established and thriving. In the fall of 2011 the serviceberries were planted at Montlake Cut Waterside, and the remainder of the cedar seedlings were planted in the Yesler Swamp area of the Union Bay Natural Area of the University of Washington's Botanical Garden. This completes the project for GCA, but we will continue to monitor the trees' progress.

On May 19, 2011, our GCA flower show "Welcome Aboard" was held at the Maritime Event Center on the waterfront. Designed to celebrate maritime Seattle, the show received enthusiastic praise from the judges and a warm reception from the public on May 20.

In the spring the SGC was among the first of the Zone XII clubs to benefit from GCA's "FA 101 Class", a new educational format for floral designers.

The SGC has a long history of support for the Montlake Cut Waterside Trail. In 1958 the original Lake Washington Ship Canal Project was a finalist for the GCA Founders Fund, and today we are still very involved. The project was originally designed by the US Army Corps of Engineers, landscape architects and the Seattle Garden Club. \$4,000 was given in 1970 and focused on the Montlake Cut portion. Constructed in 1970, this was designated as a National Recreation Trail. In 2008 the trail had suffered neglect and was found to be in serious disrepair. Concerned members of

the SGC met with representatives from the Seattle Parks Department and the US Army Corps of Engineers at the site and prepared a restoration plan. The new East Montlake Park Restoration Project received \$2,500 from Partners for Plants (P4P) in 2008 and restoration began with the support of SGC volunteers, Seattle Parks, the USACE and local Boy Scout Troop 15. \$2,500 more P4P monies from GCA were authorized this year for propagation of native plants to replace the invasives. The Montlake Cut Waterside Trail, newly renamed, is now one of our most successful ongoing projects.

In 2011 the General Meeting was the culmination of the SGC's 95th anniversary. Many of the Club's historical events can be found listed in this yearbook.

The 2012 Pam Green Horticulture Speaker was Andrea Wulf, best selling English author of *The Founding Gardeners*, a fascinating look at our founding fathers from the unique perspective of their lives as gardeners, plantsmen and farmers.

At our September meeting the SGC received two service awards, the President's Volunteer Service Award with a bronze pin and a letter from President Obama for 254 hours of work last year at the East Montlake Park, and a Certificate of Appreciation from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for "outstanding volunteer service and performance at the Lake Washington Ship Canal."

We celebrated The Centennial Year of the GCA at our February Annual Business Meeting with a presentation by Diana Neely of the organization's interesting, rich history and the moving story of the women who founded and nurtured it. The SGC once again sent two members to the NAL conference.

At our May General Meeting Thatcher Bailey, Executive Director of the Seattle Parks Foundation, spoke inspiringly about the Foundation's new projects and of the SGC's ongoing support of many park projects. Later that evening The Iris Wagner Conservation Lecture was held at the Seattle Aquarium featuring Peter Seligman and Jean Enersen discussing "We Are All Connected". The goal was protecting nature globally and locally for the well being of humanity.

The annual meeting in June featured a beautiful floral design show, "A Symphony of Flowers". This year also saw a review and revision of the ByLaws of the SGC. In 2013 we were pleased to see that the gardens of two of our members, Deborah Cheadle and Lexie Robbins, were featured in separate issues of the Seattle Times Pacific Magazine.

In August, an event was held to install the restored *Story of North Island* totem pole in the East Montlake Restoration Project, an area the SGC has supported for many years.

In January our zone and club were honored when two deserving members were elected by GCA Board of Directors to hold Zone XII GCA positions: Iris Wagner will be a Director on the GCA Board of Directors and Pam Green will serve as a Nominating Representative.

At our February 2014 annual business meeting we discussed how SGC might celebrate the

2017 SGC Centennial and increase our visibility in the community.

In June we held a Club Flower Show, "Seattle in Focus", that included horticulture, floral design and photography entries.

For several years the Garden History and Design and Photography committees have worked on a project to print books featuring a number of our members' gardens. Three beautiful books have now been published, (2010, 2012 and 2014) featuring photos taken by our own committee members.

2014-2015 was an exceptionally busy year. Arrangements proceeded for the Shirley Meneice Horticultural Conference "From Mountains to Sound" scheduled for September 2015. National conferences require a great degree of planning and organization, so praise goes to those members who volunteered so many hours throughout the year. The spring registration was filled within a record two weeks!

At the same time, SGC planning continued for the "Northwest Passages: A Garden Club of America Flower Show" held May 15-16, 2015 at the Bellevue Botanical Garden. The show was designed to explore horticulture, floral design conservation and photography. By all accounts, it was an outstanding success. The GCA judges gave us their Award of Appreciation in gratitude for our exceptional hospitality, excellent organization and efficient runners! The show included the Conservation Committee's timely display "The Bellevue Botanical Garden and Reusing Roof Rainwater Exhibit."

We continued to enjoy interesting and informative programs throughout the year. Iris Wagner enlightened us about her position as Director of Zone X11. Pam Green. Nominating Committee Representative for our Zone explained her committee's thorough process for identifying award candidates from the 200 GCA clubs. In the fall, the Conservation Committee sponsored an Electronic Recycle Drop-Off and many members took advantage of the chance to get rid of excess electronic equipment. The Photography Committee encouraged members to plan throughout the year for photo submittals to GCA Shows. The Horticulture Committee reminded us that the Elizabeth Miller Library is full of valuable plant information for the Seattle area and suggests members visit.

The Board approved plans for both the SGC's 2017 Centennial Celebration and the new SGC website. The newsletter is now available online, and both the SGC and the GCA encourage us to use email for club communications.

2015-2016 was another busy and productive year. In September, SGC hosted the Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference attended by GCA members from all over the U.S. The 2015 Holiday Auction in December raised \$32,618 for community projects. Under the helm of Hope Stroble, the Centennial Committee led a year-long effort to identify potential gift recipients to honor our 100 year anniversary in 2017. The Board approved \$100,000 for the gift, and the SGC membership elected to award those funds to the Washington Park Arboretum for the build-

ing of a new Azalea Way Centennial Garden. SGC members also cast their one vote for the GCA Founder's Fund Award for the Historic Washington Garden at the Old North Church in Boston.

May 4th, 2016 was the date of the most recent Pamela Green Lecture Series featuring the acclaimed horticulturist, Allan Armitage, Ph.D.

The East Montlake Park, the Wetherill Preserve and the CUH Fragrance Garden all benefited from many volunteer hours of weeding and restoration by our members in both fall and spring. The Conservation Committee sent two members to attend the GCA National Affairs and Legislation Conference in Washington DC. By-law revisions were made and approved at the May general meeting.

The June 2nd Annual Meeting welcomed three new Provisionals to the SGC as four others moved up to 'Active' status. Under the banner of "Seattle in Bloom" the Annual Meeting also featured a photography show which received an impressive all-show GCA commendation for excellence from the presiding Judges. We now look forward to our 100th Anniversary in 2017!

GCA PROCEDURES FOR VISITING GCA CLUB MEMBERS' GARDENS

One of your great opportunities as a GCA member is to visit the loveliest private gardens in the world. Procedures for arranging garden visits are as follows:

At least four (4) weeks, if possible, before taking a trip, a member should telephone her club's Visiting Gardens chairman for the name, address and phone number of her Visiting Gardens Zone Representative.

The Zone Representative will give the member the name of the Visiting Gardens club chairman in the city that she will be visiting.

The member then contacts the respective club chairman and gives the dates of her visit and kinds of gardens of interest to her. If there will be other people with the member, she should tell the club chairman at this time. There may be up to three non-GCA guests allowed and no more than nine (9) people in the total group. Any larger group is up to the discretion of the club chairman.

The club chairman will set up a garden tour and arrange to contact the member when she arrives in the city. Visitors need to be mindful of expecting to see GCA members' gardens during the holidays, special local events or local garden club fundraisers. The local club(s) may not be able to accommodate guests during these times. Please ask garden owners for permission to photograph their garden.

When planning a visit to Hawaii, please make your request four (4) weeks in advance. Also, Mt. Desert GC has specific rules (ask Zone Rep.).

When planning a visit to a country in which GCA has a Courtesy Club, requests to visit gardens should be made at least four (4) weeks ahead by emailing GCA staff administrator at visitinggardens@gcamerica.org or by contacting the Courtesy

Club directly. The Courtesy Clubs are: Garden Clubs of Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, Jamaica, Bermuda, Bavaria, Uruguay, and New Zealand. For more detailed information on these clubs, please see the "List of GCA Courtesy Clubs" on the GCA website.

Even though the Garden Club of Charleston is not a GCA club, there is a person to contact. Please email GCA staff administrator at visitinggardens@gcamerica.org for this information.

Remember that the Visiting Gardens Committee does not authorize using any Visiting Gardens privileges for professional purposes, i.e., for professional photography or for articles to be professionally published.

GCA club trips (more than 10 people in a group at one time) are to be a club-to-club communication, starting with the club president, no less than six months prior to the anticipated visit. It is appropriate that the visiting club make a nice donation to either the club being visited or one of its projects in appreciation. This type of trip does not fall under the aegis of the GCA Visiting Gardens committee.

AMENDED BYLAWS OF THE SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this corporation shall be THE SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB (referred to herein as "SGC".)

ARTICLE II. OBJECTS AND PURPOSES

The objects and purposes of the corporation shall be to stimulate the knowledge and the love of gardening, to aid in the protection of the quality of the environment, to encourage and assist in civic beautification, and to aid and carry on charitable, scientific and educational activities in all of the said fields.

The corporation may lease, purchase, receive by deed, devise or bequest, possess and dispose of all such real and personal property as may be necessary or convenient to carry out the objects and purposes of the corporation, and may borrow money for all lawful; corporate purposes, and execute and deliver notes, bonds or other evidences of indebtedness therefore, and may secure the repayment of any such loans, with interest, by a mortgage upon or pledge of all or any part of its real or personal property.

In the event of the dissolution of this corporation, all of its assets shall be donated to a non-profit corporation or corporations having objects and purposes similar to those of this corporation and no part of such assets may inure to the benefit of any Member or other individual.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Classes and Election. The Membership shall include the following classes of Members: Provisional, Ac-

tive, Sustaining and Non-resident. Members may include, at the discretion of the Governing Board, the following classes of Members: Honorary, Honorary Life, and Inactive. All Members shall be elected by the Governing Board, excluding Honorary Life.

Section 2. Provisional Members.

- **2.1** Qualifications. Nominations for Provisional Membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chairman of the Membership Committee. Candidates shall have the following qualifications:
 - They shall demonstrate knowledge of and interest in horticulture, conservation, floral design, landscape design, or active participation in the work of a garden.
 - They shall be willing to share actively in the work and responsibilities of SGC and shall attend Horticulture classes and General Meetings on a regular basis for the first two (2) years.
 - 3. Their principal residence shall be in Seattle or the surrounding environs.
- **2.2** Election. Candidates for Provisional Membership shall be reviewed by the Membership Committee. The recommendation of the Membership Committee shall be presented to the Governing Board for approval. Provisional Members shall be elected by the Governing Board at any Annual, Regular, or Special meeting of the Governing Board.
- **2.3** <u>Term.</u> Provisional Members are on a provisional basis for a minimum of two (2) consecutive years and no longer than three (3) years unless approved by the Governing Board.
- **2.4** <u>Voting and Privileges</u>. Provisional Members may vote on SGC matters, with the exception of changes to by-laws. However, they may neither hold office, nor be a Member of the Governing Board, nor propose or second a new Member, nor vote, nor participate in the privileges of Garden Club of America (hereinafter referred to as "GCA"). They may serve on any committee and may be chairman of a special committee.

- 2.5 Dues and Fees. Provisional Members shall pay a one time initiation fee plus annual dues and other required fees
- 2.6 <u>Compliance</u>. Failure to comply with requirements means forfeiture of Membership, including initiation fees and dues.

Section 3. Active Members.

- **3.1 Qualifications.** Nominations for Active Membership shall be presented to the Governing Board by the Chairman of the Membership Committee from the Provisional Members having the following qualifications:
 - At least two (2) years of Provisional Membership, with regular attendance at Horticulture and General meetings and other SGC events.
 - 2. Their principal residence shall be in Seattle or the surrounding environs.
 - Active participation in the work of a garden or demonstrated knowledge of and interest in horticulture, conservation, floral design, or landscape design.
 - 4. Demonstrated ability and willingness to cooperate in committee work and in the advancement of civic, cultural, horticultural, charitable, scientific and educational interests of the community.
- **3.2 Election.** Nominated candidates for Active Membership shall be reviewed by the Membership Committee. The recommendation of the Membership Committee shall be presented to the Governing Board for approval. Active Members shall be elected by the Governing Board at any Annual, Regular or Special meeting of the Governing Board.
- **3.3** GCA Membership. Active Members shall also be Members of GCA.
- **3.4** <u>Voting and Privileges</u>. Active Members shall be qualified to hold office, to be a Member of the Governing Board, to vote on all SGC matters at meetings, to propose or second new Provisional Members, and to participate in matters pertaining to GCA.

3.5 <u>Dues and Fees.</u> Active Members shall pay annual dues and other required fees.

Section 4. Sustaining Members.

- **4.1 Qualifications.** Active Members who have completed ten years of satisfactory service as Members may, upon written request to the Membership Chairman, be granted Sustaining Membership.
- **4.2** GCA Membership. Sustaining Members shall retain their Membership in GCA.
- **4.3** <u>Voting and Privileges</u>. Sustaining Members may vote on all SGC matters at meetings, may serve on committees and may exhibit at flower shows. They may not be an officer or serve on the Governing Board. They may propose or second candidates for Membership.
- **4.4** <u>Dues and Fees.</u> Sustaining Members shall pay annual dues and other required fees.

Section 5. Non-resident Members.

- **5.1** <u>Qualifications.</u> Any Member in good standing whose principal residence is no longer Seattle and surrounding environs may become a non-resident Member.
- **5.2** <u>GCA Membership</u>. Non-resident Members shall retain their Membership in GCA.
- **5.3** <u>Voting and Privileges</u>. Non-resident Members may vote on all SGC matters at meetings, may serve on committees and may exhibit at flower shows. They may hold an office or serve on the Governing Board. They may propose or second candidates for Membership.
- **5.4. Dues and Fees.** Non-resident Members shall pay annual dues and other required fees.
- **5.5** Reinstatement. A Non-resident Member, upon returning to Seattle, may be reinstated to her previous classification, with the approval of the Governing Board and without payment of an acceptance fee.

Section 6. Honorary Members

- **6.1 Qualifications.** Honorary Members may be chosen from within or without the Membership of SGC in recognition of outstanding service to SGC or the community.
- **6.2 Election**. Honorary Members shall be nominated by the Membership Committee. The Chairman of the Membership Committee shall present the nominations to the Governing Board for approval. Honorary Members shall be elected by the affirmative unanimous vote of the entire Governing Board at any Annual, Regular, or Special meeting of the Governing Board.
- **6.3** <u>Dues and Fees.</u> Honorary Members shall be exempt from dues and required fees and shall not have Active Membership responsibilities or status.

Section 7. Honorary Life Membership.

- **7.1 Qualifications.** Honorary Life Members are those Active, Sustaining or Non-resident Members who have been dues paying Members of SGC for forty-five (45) years. Such Honorary Life Members shall retain the privileges of the class of Membership from which they were transferred.
- **7.2 Election.** The Membership Chairman shall notify the Governing Board of the transfer of those to Honorary Life status.
- **7.3** <u>Dues and Fees</u>. They shall be exempt from dues and required fees.

Section 8. Inactive Membership.

- **8.1** Qualifications. The Inactive Membership shall consist of any Member who has been in good standing but due to ill health or physical disability is unable to participate in SGC activities.
- **8.2** Election. To remain on the roster that person, or her representative, may request permission in writing to become an Inactive Member.
- **8.3** <u>Dues and Fees</u>. An Inactive Member shall pay no dues to either SGC or to GCA and shall not enjoy the privileges of SGC or GCA.

Section 9. Resignation and Reinstatement.

- **9.1** Notice of Resignation. The resignation of any Member shall be made to the Membership Chairman in writing and shall, at the discretion of the Governing Board, take effect only upon the discharge of all indebtedness to SGC by the resigning Member.
- **9.2** Reinstatement. Members who have resigned in good standing may be reinstated with an affirmative vote of ten (10) Members of the Governing Board. They shall resume their previous classification of Membership.

ARTICLE IV GOVERNING BOARD, OFFICERS, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. Governance. All affairs of SGC shall be managed by the Governing Board consisting of the Officers and the Chairmen of the following Standing Committees:

Club Communications

Community Projects

Conservation

Finance

Floral Design

Horticulture

Meeting Arrangements

Membership

Nominations

Photography

Policy and Planning

Program

Ways and Means

Section 2. Officers. The Officers of SGC shall consist of President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. No two offices may be held by the same person.

- **2.1** President. The President shall preside at all General, Governing Board, and Executive Committee Meetings. The President shall consult with the President-Elect on all appointments from the Active Membership, including but not limited to: (1) a Chair for each Special Committee; (2) as needed, ad hoc committee chair(s) and members; (3) delegates to GCA Annual and Zone Meetings; and (4) delegates to other garden-related meetings. The Governing Board shall approve all appointments.
- **2.2** <u>President-Elect</u>. The President-Elect shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee. She shall preside at meetings in the absence of the President and shall assist as requested by the President. The President-Elect shall chair the Policy and Planning Committee.
- **2.3** <u>Immediate Past President.</u> The Immediate Past President shall assist as requested by the President.
- **2.4** Corresponding Secretary. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Club under the direction of the President and serve as the Yearbook Chairman.
- **2.5** Recording Secretary. The Recording Secretary shall record minutes at all Board and Executive Meetings and shall send said minutes to Board Members and appropriate GCA and Zone Officers. She shall send to the Membership any information deemed necessary. She is responsible for maintaining the permanent records of SGC.
- 2.6 Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee and shall have custody of all operating funds, properties and securities of SGC. She shall act as liaison to The Seattle Foundation who will manage the SGC Endowment Fund and any additional SGC Endowment Funds. The Treasurer's duties shall be subject to regulations as may be imposed by the Governing Board. Yearly budget requests shall be submitted by the Committee Chairman to the Treasurer who, with the Finance Committee, is responsible for preparing the budget and presenting it to the Board in the month prior to the Annual Meeting each year.

Section 3. Committees. The Governing Board may designate and appoint other committees of the board. Any such committee shall consist of two (2) or more Members of the Governing Board and shall have and exercise such authority of the Governing Board as may be specified in said resolution. However, no such committee shall have the authority of the Governing Board to amend, alter, or repeal the Bylaws; elect, appoint or remove any Member of any such committee or any Member of the Governing Board or officer of SGC; amend the Articles of Incorporation; adopt a plan of merger or adopt a plan of consolidation with another corporation; authorize the voluntary dissolution of SGC or revoke proceedings therefore; adopt a plan for the distribution of the assets of SGC not in the ordinary course of business; or amend, alter, or repeal any resolution of the Governing Board which by its terms provides that it shall not be amended, altered, or repealed by such committee. The designation and appointment of any such committee and the delegation of authority to it shall not operate to relieve the Governing Board or any individual Member of the Governing Board of any responsibility imposed on it or her by law.

- 3.1 Executive Committee. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of Officers of SGC. It shall have all the powers of the Governing Board between meetings. Any action taken by the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Governing Board at the next meeting.
- **3.2** <u>Committee Chairs</u>. Each Standing, Ad Hoc or Special Committee Chair shall report to the Governing Board at its monthly meetings or as the President may request.

3.3 Committee Membership.

 Provisional Chair and Membership Committee. In consultation with the Membership Chair and the President-Elect, the President shall select a Provisional Chair, who also shall serve as a member of the Membership Committee. In consultation with the President-Elect and the Membership Chair and with the approval of the Governing Board,

- the President shall appoint six Active Members to serve on the Membership Committee.
- 2. Nominating Committee. The President shall invite the Immediate past President to chair the Nominating Committee. In the event of a vacancy, the President in consultation with the President-Elect shall select a member to chair the Nominating Committee. In consultation with the President-Elect and with the approval of the Governing Board, the President shall appoint four Active Members to serve on the Nominating Committee.
- 3. Committee Membership. Signup sheets will be provided to SGC Members to use to express their committee preferences for the forthcoming year. The Chairs of both Standing Committees and Special Committees may select their committee Members from among those indicating an interest in their committee on the signup sheets.

Section 4. Chairmen of Standing Committees. The Chairman of each Standing Committee shall hold a meeting as they deem necessary. Their responsibilities are to adhere to the committee guidelines as established by SGC.

ARTICLE V ELECTION OF THE OFFICERS AND THE GOVERNING BOARD

Section 1. Election of Officers and Chairmen of Standing Committees.

- **1.1** Nominations. The Nominating Committee shall nominate from the Active Membership, the Officers and the Chairmen of the Standing Committees. Members of the Nominating Committee are not barred from becoming nominees for office.
- **1.2** Governing Board Approval. The Nominating Committee shall make its recommendation for approval to

the Governing Board. The Governing Board shall approve the slate of officers that shall be presented to the Members.

- **1.3** Notice to Members. A copy of the slate of officers, approved by the Governing Board, shall be provided to each Member of SGC at least two weeks prior to Annual Meeting.
- 1.4 <u>Nomination by Members</u>. Active Members may nominate additional candidates for the offices of President, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, or any Standing Committee Chairman, providing that in each case the nomination, endorsed by ten Active Members, has been presented in writing to the Recording Secretary not less than seven days before the Annual Meeting.
- **1.5 Election by Members.** Members shall elect the Officers and the Chairmen of the Standing Committees at the Annual Meeting. All elections shall be held at the Annual Meeting and shall be by 2/3 majority vote of the Members present.
- Section 2. Term. The President will serve a one (1) year term and then automatically assume the office of Immediate Past President the following year for a one (1) year term. The President-Elect will serve a one (1) year term and then automatically assume the office of President the following year, for a one (1) year term. All other Members of the Governing Board shall serve for two (2) years unless special arrangements are agreed upon by the Nominating Committee.
- **Section 3. Removal.** Removal of the President or any Member of the Governing Board may take place at any time by a 2/3 vote of the Members whenever it is in the best interest of SGC.
- **Section 4. Vacancies.** Vacancies in offices or on the Governing Board shall be filled for the remainder of the term by the Governing Board.

ARTICLE VI MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

Section 1. Annual Meeting. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Membership, on a date to be specified by the

Governing Board. At such meeting, SGC Members shall vote for Officers and Chairs of Standing Committees; the election results shall be announced; awards shall be presented and the new Provisional Members shall be introduced to the Club.

- Section 2. General Business Meeting. Annually, there shall be a Business Meeting of the Membership. The General Business Meeting shall be in lieu of the General Meeting in the month in which it is held.
- **Section 3. General Meetings.** There shall be monthly General Meetings of the Membership unless otherwise directed by the President.
- **Section 4. Quorum.** There shall be a Quorum at any meeting of the Membership in order for any vote(s) taken by the Membership to be valid. A quorum is one-fourth (1/4th) of the votes entitled to be cast at any meeting. The passage of any vote requires a two thirds (2/3rds) majority of those present.
- **Section 5. Robert's Rules of Order.** All meetings of the Membership shall be conducted according to Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VII GOVERNING BOARD MEETINGS

- **Section 1. Annual Meeting of Governing Board.** There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Governing Board, held in the Seattle region, within 45 days of the end of the SGC fiscal year.
- **Section 2. Quorum**. A quorum consisting of nine (9) Members of the Governing Board is required for all transactions. All transactions shall be accepted by a 2/3 majority vote.
- **Section 3. General Meetings**. There shall be monthly meetings of the Governing Board, unless otherwise directed by the President.
- **Section 4. Special Meetings.** Special Meetings of the Governing Board may be held at any place and time whenever called by the President, or by any two (2) Members of the Governing Board.

Section 5. Notice of Meetings. No notice of the Governing Board's Annual Meeting shall be required. Notice of the time and place of any special meeting of the Governing Board shall be given by the Secretary, or by the person or persons calling the meeting, by regular or express mail, facsimile, electronic communication, telegram, or by personal communication over the telephone or otherwise, at least three (3) days prior to the date on which the meeting is to be held. Attendance at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where the director attends a meeting for the purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened. Neither the business to be transacted, nor the purpose of any meeting of the Governing Board needs to be specified in the notice or any waiver of notice of such meeting.

Section 6. Meetings Held by Telephone or Similar Communications Equipment. Members of the Governing Board or its committees may participate in a meeting of the Governing Board or such committees by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time and participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.

Section 7. Proxies. Members of the Governing Board may not vote by proxy.

Section 8. Robert's Rules. All meetings of the Governing Board shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

ARTICLE VIII ACTIONS BY WRITTEN CONSENT

Actions by Written Consent. Any corporate action required or permitted by the Articles of Incorporation or Bylaws, or by the laws of the State of Washington, to be taken at a meeting of the Members or the Governing Board (or its committees) may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all

of the Members or the Governing Board Members entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof. Such consent shall have the same force and effect as a unanimous vote, and may be described as such.

ARTICLE IX FEES, DUES, FISCAL YEAR AND BUDGET

Section 1. Initiation Fees and Acceptance Fees. Initiation fees for Provisional members and Acceptance fees for Active members shall be determined by the Governing Board.

Section 2. Annual Dues. All dues shall be determined by the Governing Board and shall be payable annually in advance of July 1. Any Member who is delinquent in the payment of dues on August 1 shall receive a notice by certified mail, return receipt requested. If such dues are not paid by September 1, membership shall be forfeited.

Section 3. Forfeiture. If the various assessments levied during a fiscal year are not paid by a member by the end of that fiscal year, membership shall be forfeited.

Section 4. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of SGC shall be June 1 through May 31.

Section 5. Budget. The budget shall be prepared by the Finance Committee, chaired by the Treasurer, and shall be presented to the Governing Board for approval. Necessary adjustment of, or additions to, the budget may be made by the Governing Board at any time thereafter.

Section 6. Loans Prohibited. The corporation shall make no loans to any Officer or to any member of the Governing Board.

ARTICLE X ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Section 1. There shall be a SGC Endowment Fund, which shall be separate from all SGC operating funds, and shall be placed, for investment purposes, with professional manage-

ment outside SGC. The Governing Board must approve any new endowments and is responsible for placing them with professional management outside SGC for investment purposes.

ARTICLE XI DELEGATES

Section 1. Appointment. The President and a delegate appointed by the President in consultation with the President-Elect shall attend the Annual Board Meeting of GCA. The Governing Board shall approve the appointment. Should the President be unable to attend, an alternate Member shall be designated by the Governing Board.

Section 2. Reimbursement. The GCA Annual Meeting registration fees, travel expenses and room reservation of the President or her alternate and of one delegate shall be borne by SGC and limited by financial policy.

Section 3. Other Delegates. Delegates for all other purposes – Zone Meeting, Community Meetings, etc. – shall be appointed by the President, in consultation with the President-Elect and with the approval of the Governing Board.

ARTICLE XII AMENDMENTS

Section 1 Recommendations for changes may come from the Governing Board when approved by vote of ten (10) Members of the Governing Board or on the written proposal of not less than twenty-five (25) Active Members.

Section 2. These Bylaws may be altered, amended, or appealed at any meeting of the Membership of SGC by a majority vote (2/3rds) of the Active, Sustaining, and Non Resident Members present, provided that notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to each such Member two (2) weeks prior to the date of the meeting. These Bylaws will be updated annually and thoroughly reviewed every three (3) years.

POLICIES OF SEATTLE GARDEN CLUB

REVISIONS

I. The Policy and Planning Committee shall review proposed revisions to an SGC policy. After completing its review, the Committee shall forward its recommendation to the Governing Board for its further consideration.

COMMUNITY PROJECTS

- **I.** The Community Projects Committee solicits and reviews requests for funding of projects from the community or a committee of the SGC. All projects shall be consistent with the objects and purposes of SGC. (See Article 11, B-3)
 - II. Guidelines for Community Projects
 - 1. Benefit to community
 - 2. Stated financial need
 - 3. Opportunity for membership participation, oversight and use of membership expertise
 - 4. Appropriate to size and strength of membership
 - 5. Source of pride and identity for SGC
 - 6. Long term maintenance assured
 - 7. Opportunity for collaboration with other community organizations
 - 8. Educational value to the community
 - 9. Timeline of the project
- **III.** Deadline for the Committee to receive requests is November 1st. Any exceptions will be at the discretion of the Committee.

IV. All recommendations for funding made by the Community Projects Committee shall be approved by the Governing

Board. An individual project of \$2,500 and above shall be approved both by the Governing Board and by the membership. A project that would cause the fiscal total of all new projects in one year to exceed \$10,000 shall be approved both by the Governing Board and by the membership.

V. Funds from the Project and Charitable account shall be used to fund projects. The Finance Committee shall budget the amount of funds available to be awarded for Community Projects in the upcoming fiscal year and shall retain a budget cushion of at least \$50.000 in reserve.

FINANCIAL POLICIES

I. Accounts

- 1. The funds of SGC are accounted for in three categories.
 - a. Administrative Account Income to the Administrative Account comes from a portion of membership dues. Expenditures from the Administrative Account are expenses which support SGC operations.
 - b. <u>Program Account</u> Income to the Program Account comes from a portion of membership dues and from all fees. Expenditures from the Program Account enhance the programs for and education of SGC members and guests.
 - c. Project and Charitable Account Income to the Project and Charitable Account comes from fund raising, flower shows, special projects, endowment distributions and contributions. Expenditures shall be used to support the objects and purposes of SGC including community projects or contributions to other organizations, fund raising expenses, flower show expenses and special project expenses.
- 2. Endowment distribution (income) may be accumulated for a future project or remain in the Endowment Fund at the discretion of the Governing Board.
- 3. Excess funds, which accumulate in all SGC accounts, may be invested in a safe instrument upon the recommen-

dation of the Finance Committee and the approval of the Governing Board.

4. All donations, memorials and bequests received shall be credited to the Project and Charitable Account unless otherwise specified by the donor.

II. SGC Endowment Funds

1 SGC Endowment Fund

- a. Shall provide a permanent source of funding to support the objects and purposes of SGC. As an Endowment Fund, only the distribution can be used each year.
- SGC Endowment Fund shall be managed by The Seattle Foundation with the Treasurer as liaison to The Foundation.
- Gifts may be sent to SGC or directly to The Seattle Foundation-SGC Endowment Fund.
- d. Gifts may be made in the form of direct cash, contributions, or appreciated property. The President of SGC shall be responsible for appropriate acknowledgement of the gift.

III. SGC Speaker Endowment Funds

1. The Pamela Green Speaker Fund

- a. Shall provide speaker fee and expenses to be used for featuring well-known speakers to further promote Horticulture. SGC may use the speaker for GCA or SGC events and also as a tool for fundraising. It is permissible to draw down the fund below the growth needed to keep up with inflation with the understanding that over time the fund will be permitted to grow to the appropriate level.
- b. Shall be managed by the Seattle Foundation. Distributions from the Fund will be used for the expenses of the speaker events. The SGC Treasurer shall be the liaison to the Seattle Foundation.
- The SGC President and President-Elect will consult to appoint a Chair, who will, in turn, form a special

committee to include Horticulture Committee and Finance Committee representatives and others as needed for the specific event. As funds allow, the committee shall plan events and/or major speakers with the SGC Board's approval.

- 2. The Iris Wagner Conservation Lectureship Fund
 - a. Shall fund lectures focusing on Conservation.
 - b. Shall be managed by the Seattle Foundation. Distributions from the Fund will be used for the expenses of the speaker events. The SGC Treasurer shall be the liaison to the Seattle Foundation.
 - c. The SGC President and President-Elect will consult to appoint a Chair, who will, in turn, form a special committee to include Conservation Committee and Finance Committee representatives and others as needed for the specific event. As funds allow, the committee shall plan events and/or major speakers with the SGC Board's approval.

IV. General

1. Reimbursements

- a. All reimbursement requests submitted to the Treasurer shall be accompanied by a receipt and a reimbursement form approved by the appropriate committee chair.
- b. GCA Annual Meeting fees and expenses shall be reimbursed up to \$1000, per person for a maximum of two people.
- c. The registration fee, and up to \$300 of expenses, for a maximum of two members to attend the Horticulture Workshop, the Zone XII Meeting, the National Affairs and Legislation Meeting and the Zone XII President's Meeting shall be paid by SGC.
- 2. Signature cards for all checking, savings, investment accounts and safe deposit box shall be updated each June.
- 3. All restricted gifts to SGC shall be reviewed by the Governing Board and accepted or rejected on a case-by-

case basis, based on the appropriateness to SGC objects and purposes as well as to possible tax consequences.

V. SGC Contributions to Other Organizations

- a. The Horticulture Chair and the Conservation Chair, after consultation with their respective committees, will combine their recommendations for contributions to organizations.
- Requests shall be submitted to the Finance Committee for approval.
- c. Combined requests shall not exceed \$3000; subject to yearly review.

VI. Dues and Acceptance Fees

- 1. Membership dues shall be \$230 for Provisional, Active and Sustaining Members, including transfers. Dues for Non-Resident Members shall be \$110 per year. Honorary Life Members and Inactive Members do not pay dues.
- 2. Meeting Arrangements fees shall be \$145 per year and are required from Active and Provisional Members. They are optional for Honorary Life, Sustaining and Non-Resident Members.
- 3. The initiation fee for Provisional Members shall be \$125.
- 4. Upon acceptance into Active Member status there shall be an additional acceptance fee of \$50.
- 5. The acceptance fee for members transferring into SGC shall be \$125
- 6. SGC pays \$60 to GCA in annual dues for each member, excluding inactives.

MEMBERSHIP POLICIES

I. The Membership Committee shall be selected by the President in consultation with the President-Elect and the Membership Chair. The Committee shall be composed of the Chair and seven members, each member selected for a

staggered three year term. For purposes of voting, a quorum [five members plus Chair] of the Membership Committee shall be present. Balloting shall take place at the last meeting prior to the presentation of the list of candidates to the Governing Board. A separate written ballot shall be cast for each candidate. Six affirmative votes shall be cast in person or by proxy for the vote to carry. The Chair does not vote.

II. Proposal for Provisional Membership

- 1. Candidates for Provisional membership shall be proposed and seconded by Active, Sustaining or Non-Resident Members, none of whom shall be members of the Membership Committee, relatives, or relatives by marriage.
- 2. Proposal for membership shall be made to the Membership Chair on forms furnished by the Chair. Forms must be postmarked no later than midnight December 15.
- 3. Candidates shall be personally known by two members of the Governing Board and/or Membership Committee and at least four Active and/or Sustaining Members of SGC.
- 4. An Active or Sustaining Member may propose or second only one candidate each year.
- 5. A Candidate who fails two times to pass the Membership Committee or the Governing Board may not be proposed again.

III. Election to Provisional Membership

- 1. The Membership Committee shall carefully consider each candidate proposed for Provisional membership.
- 2. At the March meeting of the Governing Board, the Membership Chair shall present for consideration the names of those candidates recommended by the Membership Committee for Provisional membership.
- 3. Election to Provisional membership shall take place by written ballot at the April meeting of the Governing Board. Election shall require the affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. Votes may be cast in person, or by a ballot mailed or sent by electronic means previous to the April meeting. There shall be no more than two negative votes.

- 4. Upon election of a candidate to Provisional membership, a formal invitation, including the amount of the initiation fee, shall be sent by the Membership Chair. A letter from the President and a letter from the Membership Chair shall immediately follow. Provisional membership shall become effective upon written acceptance of the invitation and upon payment of the initiation fee. Response and initiation fee shall be sent to the Membership Chair by a date decided by the Governing Board.
- 5. The Membership Chair shall notify the candidate's proposer and seconder of the decision of the Governing Board and remind them of their responsibilities for the new Provisional Member
- 6. The Provisional Chair is appointed by the President and the Membership Chair.

PROVISIONAL EXPECTATIONS

A Provisional Member is expected to:

- Plan to attend General Meetings held September through June in the morning on the third Thursday of the month.
- Plan to attend monthly Horticultural Meetings held October through June (except December) in the morning on the first Monday of the month.
- Plan to attend a one-day provisional orientation/retreat in the late summer/early fall of the first provisional year.
- Participate in Seattle Garden Club classes, workshops, community projects and field trips when they are offered.
- Participate in Seattle Garden Club Public Events (Holiday Luncheon, Public Speakers, Flower Shows, etc.)
- Create a table decoration for the Christmas Luncheon.
- Serve on Committees which are of interest to you.
 - ° First year: Attend one meeting of four different "Standing Committees."
 - ° Second year: Select two committees on which to serve.

- Make a presentation to the general membership on a gardening topic of interest to you with the guidance of the chair of the Horticulture Committee and Provisional Chair.
- Pay annual membership dues of \$210 and pay a meeting arrangements fee of \$145. Upon acceptance into Active Member status there shall be an additional acceptance fee of \$50.

IV. Election to Active Membership

- 1. At the March meeting of the Governing Board, the Membership Chair shall present for consideration the names of those Provisional candidates recommended by the Membership Committee for Active membership.
- 2. Election to Active membership from Provisional status shall take place by written ballot at the April meeting of the Governing Board. Election shall require the affirmative vote of ten members of the Governing Board. Votes must be cast in person, or by a ballot mailed or sent by electronic means previous to the April meeting. There shall be no more than two negative votes. In the event that there is no meeting of the Governing Board, voting will be held by unanimous written consent of its members.

MEMBER TRANSFER POLICIES

I. Transfer from SGC

1. An Active or Sustaining Member who becomes nonresident may request the SGC President to send to the President in her new community a letter stating that she is an SGC Member in good standing.

II. Transfer into SGC

- A GCA Member wishing to transfer into SGC shall reside in the Seattle area at least one year.
- 2. The President of the Transfer's former GCA Club shall write a letter to the Membership Chair stating that the candidate is a member in good standing.

- 3. The candidate shall be proposed by an Active or Sustaining Member of SGC who knows her.
- 4. The Transfer candidate shall have attended some meetings of SGC and shall understand its objects, purposes and operations.
- 5. The SGC Membership committee shall process the application of the transferring candidate who shall enter SGC as Active or Sustaining Member, whichever she chooses.
- A Transfer has the option of joining the Provisional class for one year.

PROVISIONAL TRANSFER POLICIES

- I. Transfer into SGC
- 1. A GCA Club Provisional wishing to transfer into SGC shall reside in the Seattle area for at least one year.
- 2. The President of the Provisional Transfer's former GCA Club shall write a letter to the Membership Chair stating that the candidate is a Provisional in good standing.
- 3. The candidate shall be proposed by an Active or Sustaining Member of SGC who knows her.
- 4. The Provisional Transfer candidate shall have attended some meetings of SGC and shall understand its objects, purposes and operations.
- 5. The SGC Membership committee shall process the application of the transferring candidate who shall enter SGC as a Provisional Member for two years.

MEMORIAL POLICY

- 1. The death of a member will be announced through email, in the Newsletter and at the Annual Meeting. It may also be announced at other SGC meetings.
- The Corresponding Secretary will send a note to the family.
- Individual members may make a contribution to the SGC Endowment Fund.
