Community Projects Report

At the February Annual Business Meeting, the membership voted to fund three proposals from the Community Projects budget including:

- A grant of \$7,000 for SGC's internal project to build an arbor for climbing roses at the CUH Fragrance Garden
- A grant of \$5,000 to the University of Washington Press toward the publication of the second edition of Flora of the Pacific Northwest
- A grant of \$30,000 over three years, with a recommendation of \$12,000 this year, for the new Burke Museum Garden (with award letter to mention importance of long-term maintenance and educational signage).

These important gifts to the community are funded with proceeds from the SGC Holiday Auction. The Community Projects Committee thanks everyone for their very generous support of the Auction!!

Gardener's Corner

A FOUNDING FATHER'S FAVORITE FRUIT by Debbi Wilson

For 50 years, Monticello was Thomas Jefferson's laboratory of horticultural experiments. He was passionate about growing, especially fruits. From 1769 to 1814, he planted 1000 fruit trees in the South Orchard: apples, peaches, plums, nectarines, almonds, apricots and quince. Above all others, Jefferson preferred peaches.

His orchard contained 160 peach trees, but hundreds more served as an ornamental fence for his fields. Peaches were popular because they were easy to grow in the hot, humid Virginia climate. They bore fruit soon after planting, and could be propagated from seed.

His many visitors and friends devoured the fruit from the Monticello trees, and often dried them for winter consumption. Peaches could be used to make *mobby*, (peach brandy), a favorite in Virginia. Peaches were also used as feed for hogs and fuel for fires.

A few varieties from the 19th century survive today: Oldmixon Cling, Health Cling, Indian Blood and Morris' Red Rareripe.

GCA Report

GCA Fellowship

Purpose: To support specialized graduate study and research in ecological restoration, the "active healing of the land." Ecological Restoration is further defined as "the process of assisting the recovery and management of ecological integrity. Ecological integrity includes a critical range of variability in biodiversity, ecological processes and structures, regional and historical context, and sustainable cultural practices." The goal of this fellowship is to support research that will advance knowledge and increase the numbers of scientists in this important field.

History: This GCA Fellowship was established in 2000 with funds from the John B. Young Charitable Trust as well as from GCA members and clubs. John and Marge Young of Waterloo, lowa are the parents of Marilyn Magid (Cedar Rapids GC, Zone XI), who has served on GCA's Executive Committee and as Chairman of the Conservation and National Affairs and Legislation Committees.

Provisions: Provides an annual grant of \$8000 for study and research at a leading accredited university in the United States.

Eligibility: Open to graduate students. Fields of study of past recipients have ranged from forestry to

applied plant sciences to ecology and evolutionary biology. Eligibility is open to U.S. Citizens and permanent residents who are enrolled in a U.S. - based institution.

Katya Jay is a PhD candidate in the Integrative Biology Department at Oregon State University in Corvallis. She studies relationships between beach grasses, dune geomorphology, and extreme storm events. She is investigating the recovery of coastal dune systems following Hurricane Matthew by comparing natural and managed dunes along the Outer Banks of North Carolina in Cape Lookout National Seashore. The dunes of the barrier island provide the coastline with critical protection against flooding and storm surges for nearby communities. She will conduct field surveys every four months over the next two years, and the results of her research will be used to inform coastal ecosystem

management about dune restoration techniques.
