### **The Garden Club of America and The Royal Horticulture Society Interchange Fellowship celebrates 70 years this year.**

The following information is from the GCA Scholarship website:

**Purpose:** To foster British-American relations through the interchange of scholars in horticulture, landscape architecture, and related fields and to promote the exchange of information in the horticultural field.

**History:** In 1948 the Hillsborough Garden Club in California proposed the idea of fostering British American relations through an exchange of scholars in horticulture, landscape architecture and related fields by supporting a British Exchange student for a year in America. In 1950 the English Speaking Union offered a reciprocal fellowship for an American Student to study in Britain, and by 1952 The Garden Club of America voted to make the Interchange Fellowship a permanent project. Financial sponsorship in the UK has been provided by various institutions, including the McLaren Family, and the American Scholar was once known as the Martin McLaren Scholar. Now the fellowship is sponsored and administered by the Royal Horticultural Society, and the scholar is known as the Royal Horticultural Society Interchange Fellow.

The Interchange Fellowships are a reciprocal exchange program, sponsored by The Garden Club of America in the US and the Royal Horticultural Society in the UK. More than 100 students have participated in the Interchange Fellowship Program, and many have gone on to hold prominent positions in public garden management, horticulture, education, and landscape architecture. The opportunities available to the fellows are unique in the horticultural field, and the network of past Fellows is a lasting legacy.

## **Gardener's Corner** by Debbi Wilson

### **A PHENOMENAL CREATURE**

Hummingbirds are found in the Western hemisphere from Southeast Alaska to Southern Chile; of the 300 species, just 12 summer in North America. Because its wings flap at 40-80 beats per second, they produce a humming sound, thus the name. Some remarkable facts about this bird include: its lifespan is four years, it consumes 50% of its weight in nectar per day, takes 250 breaths per minute at rest, and its heart rate is 250 beats per minute. To top that, the small bird can fly right, left, up, down, backward, upside down, and can hover in a "figure 8" pattern. They can zoom 25 miles per hour in normal flight, BUT 40 mph in the courtship dive!

Black-chinned, Calliope and Rufous hummingbirds can be found year round in the Northwest, but Calypte Anna (Anna's hummingbird), is the most prevalent species. Its familiar green back, grey white underbelly and golden flanks are a pleasant sight in the area. Only four inches long, Anna's needs fresh water for drinking and bathing, such as a garden mister. It eats nectar, tree sap, insects, and pollen from brightly colored tubular flowers. The bird needs a safe haven for rest and nesting, such as tall shrubs to shield it from predators.

Most of you have many of these plants that hummingbirds enjoy in your garden, from the following list.

Petunia, Fuschia, Geranium, Lupine, Phlox, Knifophia ( Red Hot Poker), Lonicera ( Honeysuckle), Campsis radicans ( Trumpet Vine )

Hibiscus syriacus, Syringia vulgaris, ( Lilac) Sambucus (Elderberry), Rubus spectabilis ( Salmonberry), Ribes ( Currant)

## Horticulture Guidelines

### For Nature's Poetry Preview, June 7, 2018 Horticulture Guidelines

Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information and Timetable for Exhibitors.

Entries must have been owned and grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of six-months.

Saucers, stakes, and ties are allowed when appropriate and unobtrusive. Mats and stands are not allowed.

Classes may be sub-divided and entries moved and/or reclassified at the discretion of the show committee and/or the judges.

Containers are measured at the diameter or the diagonal of the widest point on the inside of the rim at the soil line.

Container-grown plants may be exhibited in containers that are clean, unobtrusive and compatible with the exhibit. Terracotta clay pots are preferred. Disguised double potting and top dressing are permitted; top dressing must not float when watered. Moss (rooted or unrooted) is allowed as a top dressing, but not considered an additional plant. Saucers required where needed to prevent leakage.

Required use of Botanical Names: All horticulture entries must be identified with correct botanical names: example: Malus floribunda, is underlined, the Genus is capitalized, the species is not.
